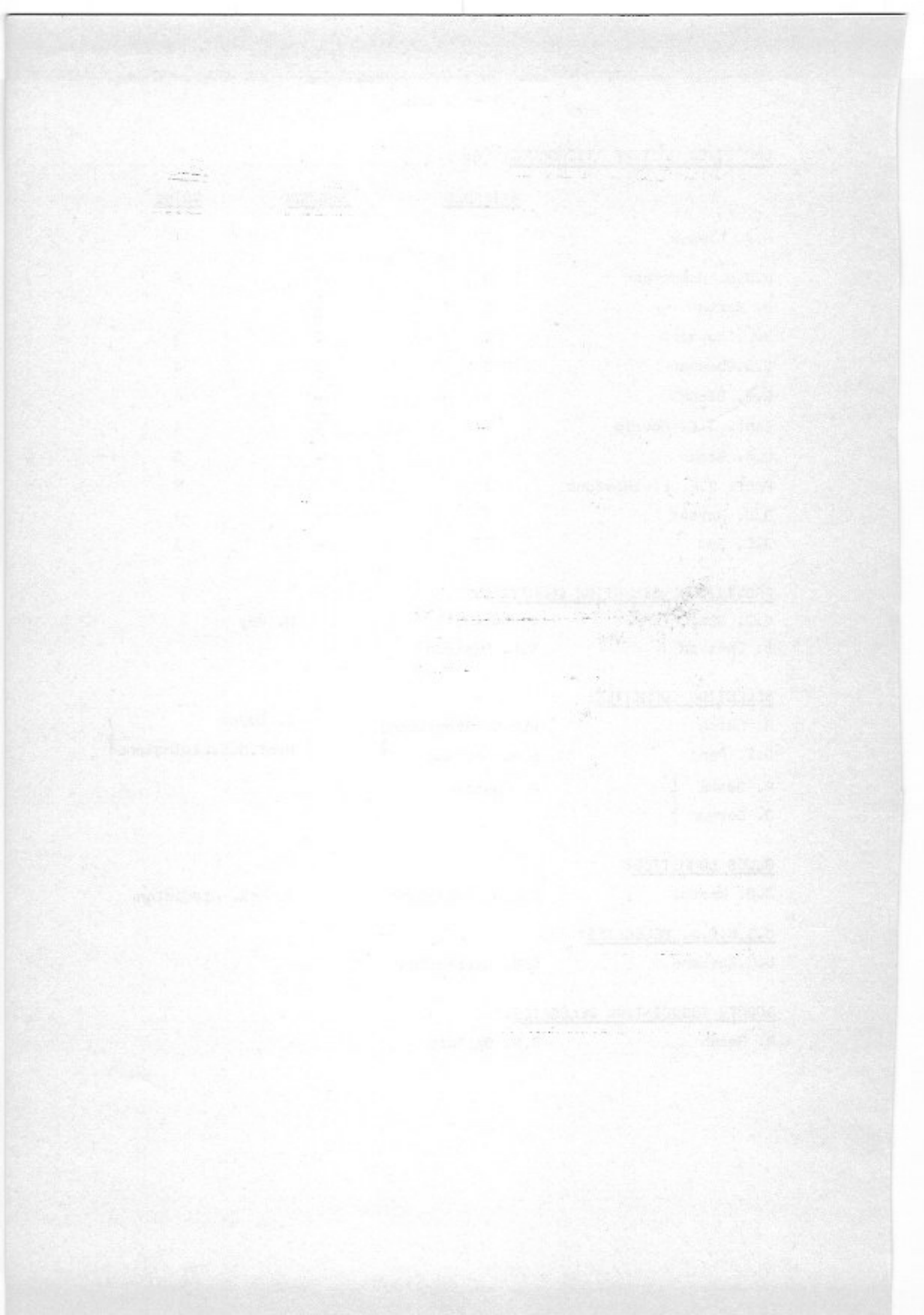

REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Twenty Fifth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is presented for your approval and adoption.

The 1974-75 season was the second year in which the Club participated in the Grade Cricket competition. As a result of the lessons learnt from our difficult initiation into the senior ranks last season, the club was more able to competently approach the level of efficiency required both on and off the field. The excellent successes of our Intervarsity, Poidevin-Gray and Second Grade teams were, in no doubt, due somewhat to the application of the experience gained.

The Club fielded five grade teams and one C & S team this season. The first grade competed with moderate success but of their three successes two were spectacular affairs with victories over the then competition leader Gordon and later in the season an outright victory over Sydney after dismissing them for the season's lowest total in their second innings (34). The second grade, in stark contrast to their solitary win of last season, achieved the remarkable feat of winning six of their last seven matches to easily capture the Encouragement Award. The third and fourth grades were for the most part found wanting in experience and perseverance if not enthusiasm, but there is obviously a lot of worthwhile talent in those ranks ready to be developed. Fifth grade was a strong contender for a semi-final berth up until Christmas but found the subsequent turnover of players too great to maintain the standard required. The City and Suburban side played with enthusiasm and some little success in spite of the perennial difficulties of such a competition.

The outstanding success of the season was undoubtedly the run of our Intervarsity team which went through the season undefeated culminating in convincingly winning the Intervarsity Carnival held in Brisbane in January. Congratulations especially to their captain, Jock Martel, for a job well done and for bringing home the "AUCHMUTY CUP" in its inaugural year of presentation.

Somewhat less a success but yet no more pleasing from the long term view of the club was the highly creditable performance of the Poidevin-Gray side, ably led by Chris Chapman, which went through their competition undefeated but, unfortunately, failed by only one point to gain a place in the final. One of the teams making the final were fortunate in that they did not play us.

Our social fixtures were well in prominence with a number of matches being played, including those against a Sydney University invitation side, Newcastle University and the usual Staff versus Students match, as well as the annual pre-season matches against Randwick and Burwood. One regrettable aspect of the club's

social activities was the poor attendance given to a number of post-match barbecues and such like. It is to be hoped that next season club members more willingly support these activities for they immeasurably contribute towards the development of club spirit.

Nevertheless our Annual Dinner was extremely well attended and generally acknowledged as highly successful. Michael Bayne proved a highly entertaining speaker. Mark Tay was winner of the E.H. Davis Trophy for the best all rounder for the second year in succession whilst Ian Smith was recipient of the Capt. John Morris Trophy for the club's best fieldsmen. Rod Zabell was awarded the newly instituted Encouragement Award Trophy for his consistent batting.

On the financial side the committee remedied a lot of the problems that had been prevalent last season and as a result finished the season in a highly satisfactory financial position.

The Club's management committee achieved a far greater degree of harmony and professionalism in relation to its functions this year. There was a greater willingness on behalf of Committee members to help in the successful maintenance of the Club's activities.

Although it is impossible in such a report to mention all the individuals who have given the club their continued support it would be remiss of us not to mention the invaluable assistance given by Mrs. Pratt and Mrs. Chapman in organising the afternoon teas. To Rick Wegner many thanks for always being available to umpire our social games.

We look forward to the 1975-76 season where it is hoped that given the highly encouraging performances of the past season, as well as the potential unearthed, the club will achieve even more satisfying results.

First grade was a complete mixture which varied between near excellence to disaster. The most critical of statistics is the First Innings. It was significant that we were beaten in our first 5 games, yet we didn't get beaten in our last 5 games. Overall we won 3 games, had 5 games where we went close to winning, had 5 bad beatings (4 in the first part of the season) and 5 draws.

Due to the space available I will only comment on critical points of our play.

The most outstanding batting performance was by David Pratt. A lot of David's runs came under pressure when the team needed them badly. In the 6 games where batsmen put the team in a winning position, David scored 222 runs averaging 45. In addition his mental stability, (on the field) gamesmanship and team spirit was a fine example.

Secondly, Chris Chapman scored 159 runs in his first 11 games, whilst in the last 7 games he scored 230 runs, averaging 38. Thirdly, Mark Ray who as an opener stayed at the crease an average of nearly an hour (average 22) performed really well considering most wickets started off being damp (we hope next year the Village Green won't be watered on Saturday). All batsmen at times performed well, but we need improvement against good seamers on green wickets.

Lastly, Richard Pym on 80% of his first 5 overs either got a wicket or a missed chance. His hostility often enabled other bowlers to get wickets. Unfortunately, his second spells damaged his average dramatically.

FIELDING : This overall was quite good with Jim Robson becoming one of Sydney's top slip fieldsmen. In addition, Jock Martel was fantastic in the field anywhere, whether in slips or in the outfield.

NEXT YEARS PROSPECTS :

With full team practises and first rate wickets, we could even be Semi-final contenders within 2 seasons. This also depends so much on whether the club as a whole can develop a professional fighting winning team spirit, ON THE FIELD OF PLAY.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

The seconds created history for the club in 1974-75 by winning the Encouragement Award for Second Grade. This is the club's initial Award since entering grade. This achievement was due to playing talent, team spirit and luck, not necessarily in that order. Before the Encouragement Award matches began we sometimes had the talent, rarely the luck and sometimes the spirit, but never enough of all three to make our mark on the opposition. Without disrespect to those in the seconds at the beginning of the year (some of them ended in first grade, i.e. Geoff Kirkwood, Ian Smith, Jim Robson), the combined talent of the team was strongest in the last six or seven rounds. With a batting order of Alex Taylor, Peter Burnett, Darryl Smith, Roger Robertson, Alan Jacobs, Geoff Kirkwood or Paddy Grattan-Smith, Dave Barbour, Peter Noble we see that all except two has had some reasonably successful first grade experience. The bowlers (sorry to omit them from the batsmen) were Craig Brown, Phil Watkins, Geoff Garland, Geoff Kirkwood or Paddy Grattan-Smith, with support from "Poppin" Peter Noble. All of the bowlers have had first grade experience. The fielding had its moments, we dropped catches but in our winning streak at the end of year the fielding was as good as any Uni team I have played for. We had many wicketkeepers. Dave Barbour saw us through the hard times to end up in the winning combination. Jeff Lemossurier kept wonderfully in extreme conditions against Wests. So much for the winning talent. But others had successes. Jeff Cutler scored well and was unfortunate to be dropped. Tony McKendry had early successes only to run into a dreadful series of zeros. Brian Pink's bowling almost won us the game against Mosman. Steve Lockhard and David Williams both gave 100% efforts and Steve's fielding was an inspiration to the whole team. Others were with us, thanks for your efforts. The club hopes you will continue to strive to gain that extra grade to enjoy the higher standard of cricket.

That's the playing talent. Now the team spirit. Initially it was high. The winning draw with Petersham, the good fight against Cumberland (1973-74 Premiers), the thrashing given to Randwick lead to good team spirit. However, around this time the "great selection purge" lead to many team changes, confused players and a disillusioned captain. Subsequently the seconds disintegrated against Gordon and Sydney Uni. We struggled on. Some close losses against Mosman and Manly gave us heart. Some defeats, although by large margins, we made them struggle all the way (i.e. North Sydney and Sutherland). Some disasters made us cry (Nepenean, Balmain). This brought us to late January and the battle of the wooden spoon and the start of the Encouragement Award. Many got some runs and we totalled 135. Craig Brown split Sydney's innings with 3 quick wickets. After a week of dry weather poor Sydney were faced on the second Saturday with a damp wicket. "Charlie" Brown had injured his shoulder bowling wronguns with tennis balls in the lounge room but enter "Wet Wicket" Watkins. Combining with Geoff Garland and Paddy Grattan-Smith, Phil dismissed Sydney twice and left us 60 in 4 overs. To the team's credit (or stupidity) we went for them, unsuccessfully.

Wests at Pratten was our next hurdle. They had to get points to stay in the semis race. On putting us in on a wet track they must have been looking for 10 points. They got none and we almost grabbed the 10. Darryl Smith, opening because Peter Burnett was admiring the seagulls at Concord Oval some miles away, was run-out without facing a ball. Wickets fell but Alan Jacobs hit strongly to score a meritorious 40. Peter Noble hit 25 off about 10 balls and Watkins hit his highest score of the year - 163 was a good score. With the wicket driving and gripping, Watkins was wound up and let loose. He took the first and last wickets, with four others in between, to assist Paddy Grattan-Smith in removing Wests for 118 at 5.45 p.m. Rain at 5.30 p.m. the following week saved Wests as Watkins was again relishing the wet conditions. Next we accounted for eventual premiers Bankstown. On a bone hard pitch, sunny day, the gamble of sending the opposition into bat had immediate dividends. Wickets in each of the first four overs from Brown and Watkins saw Bankstown unable to recover. We passed their 126 with 2 down. A "hit and giggle" second innings almost saw us losing outright. Waverley found our batting too consistent and Geoff Garland's experience too good as we coasted in. That's four in a row. The redraw and why St. George? Our opposition had some very good experienced cricketers. We batted first and again many got runs and at 6/211 we declared. At 1/108 they were cruising but with Geoff Kirkwood and Craig Brown bowling well and good fielding, St. George were all out at 216, still going for the runs. A great game of cricket and it sealed the Encouragement Award for us.

Team thanks are due to Hilary Taylor, my wife and parents for so many afternoon tea productions. I hope their reward was the smiling faces at the seasons end. To all the players thanks for your co-operation and understanding. Finally, my thanks to vice-captain Geoff Garland. Much of the team's success and mine were due to his knowledge and experience of players and conditions. I look forward to 1975-76 and hope to see the same faces, plus a few new ones, at the seasons beginning.

THIRD GRADE REPORT

What can I say of a season that begins with two excellent wins followed by only 2 more wins the whole season? In our first two games the fielding was little short of brilliant with every catch being taken and the bowling tight. Yet in the subsequent 21 innings by the opposition they were fully dismissed on only 4 occasions. Indeed, in the third match we lost by an innings to Cumberland after dropping 11 catches! We never approached the outstanding form of the first two rounds until, ironically enough, the last match of the season when St. George, thanks to some dogged tail end batting forced a draw.

These figures may suggest that bowling and fielding were our major weaknesses but this is too simple a deduction. On a considerable number of occasions the batsmen failed to give the bowlers a reasonable total to bowl at. This is best illustrated by the fact that we never passed the 200 mark once and passed 150 in the first innings only 4 times. There is one simple, undeniable reason for this - a continued lack of application by our batsmen. I will accept as partial excuse having to play on the variable David Phillips wicket. However, no batsmen could honestly suggest that this factor alone explains the repeated failures of the team. In my view the root cause of these failures is the lack of the "will to win" shown by a number of players throughout the season. However from this general criticism I must exclude such players as Steve Campbell, Rod Zabell, Steve Lockhart and Asoka Wijeratne.

In the bowling department the same criticism regarding competitive attitudes applies with the reservation that good bowling needs to be supported by good fielding which was sadly lacking in the great majority of matches. As mentioned earlier, the bowlers on numerous occasions had little to bowl at but this, of course, does not excuse their failure to "stick" to the task when the going got tough.

Time after time during the season there was a depressing lack of effort by the team to fight all the way. To many players their cricket was merely a social fixture and this attitude was reflected not only in their approach to batting, bowling and fielding, but also in punctuality, dress and practice attendance. Social cricketers have little future in this club.

Nevertheless, there are several players worthy of praise for their contributions during the 1974/75 season. Steve Campbell was one player who could be relied on to give his "all" every time he was asked for an effort. Apart from being a reliable slips fieldsmen, Steve is probably the most promising all rounder in club ranks. His leg spinners drew praise from opposing captains and batsmen alike. His batting was a lesson to those less disciplined amongst us.

Asoka Wijeratne is the most naturally gifted cricketer in the club. His batting is a delight to watch, if he gets going. I rate his 57 against Nepean, coming in at 5-51 the best

innings in third grade I saw, for or against us. His bowling was always tight and penetrative, his fielding first-class.

John Finlay was one player who came to us midway through the season and showed me that with his correct technique and attractive stroke-making he is a player worthy of higher consideration.

Steve Lockhart, while lacking total orthodoxy more than makes up for it with a fighting spirit depressingly lacking in other batsmen. Both on and off the field Steve was a great team man.

Ian McTae was our most successful bowler but deprived himself of even greater success by often losing his length or direction when trying too hard. The best bowling performance of the season was by Ian when he took (only) 3-36 against Manly but bowled so magnificently in a very tight situation so as to deserve far more flattering figures.

I would like to pay special thanks to Brian (et tus) Pink, my unflappable vice-captain. Many a time I sought solace in Brian's wisdom when things got bad - which was quite often. As the opening bowler more pressure was consistently placed on Brian than anybody else and to his credit he rarely failed to provide encouragement for the rest of the team.

Other players I would like to give my thanks for their efforts through the season are Tony Mckendry, in spite of his mouth; Rod Zabell, 100% team - a captain's dream; Steve Tait (5-66) and John Ingleson (7-26) for two outstanding bowling performances and Ross Fitzgerald, I'd never seen a "golden pair" before.

For my part the season was a difficult one for a number of reasons, not the least being my inexperience in captaining a grade side. As Inge once said, "Experience is a good teacher, but her fees are high".

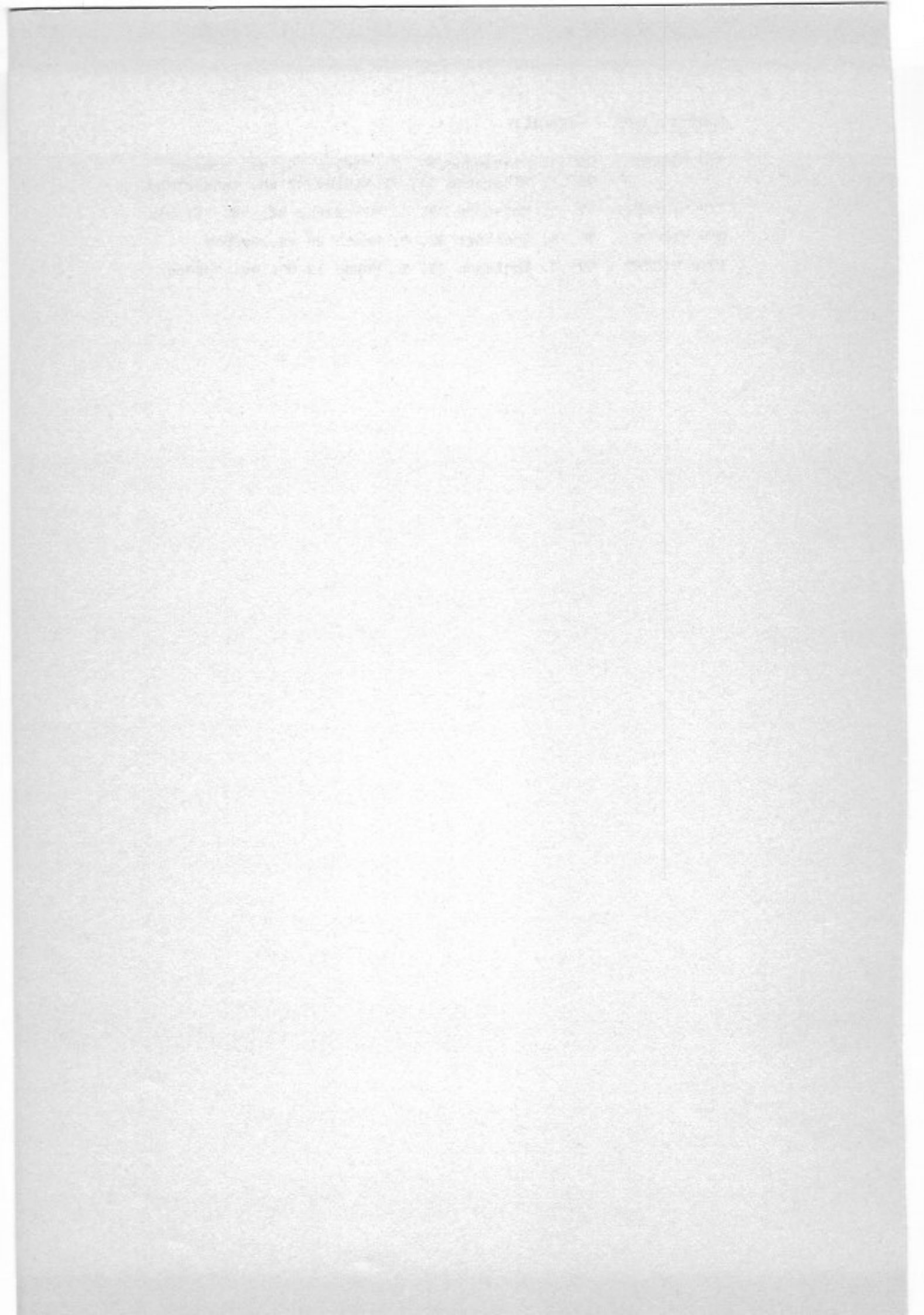

FOURTH GRADE REPORT

The 1974-75 season proved to be far more successful for the Fourth Grade than the previous season. When compared to our last 1st year in grade cricket, the improvement, particularly batting, was tremendous. We suffered fewer outright losses (9 to 2) and scored more wins (19 to 31 points). Undoubtedly having settled more into the class of cricket and addition of new players has greatly strengthened the club whilst older members of the club have adjusted more to the transition from shires to grade, further application and greater attendance at practice will further benefit the club.

The strength of Fourth Grade for the first time in years lay in its batting, having doubled the average per wicket lost to the previous season. Unfortunately the bowling was not capable of capitalising on this strength. Had our bowling been up to 1973-74 level at least 3 or 4 more wins could have been anticipated. However, with limited success the bowling attack rested in the main with four players who gave their best under, at times, trying circumstances. I would like to apologise to the team and particularly the bowlers as for most of the season they did not have the fourth best wicket keeper available in the club, for which others bear the responsibility of this situation.

For part of the season Fourth Grade aided Fifth Grade in their unsuccessful bid to qualify for a semi-final place. This whilst correct, did however lessen our chances of success but enabled Fifth Grade to stabilise and build team spirit. Some players however, after earlier success, put self before club in wanting to continue in lower grades to the disadvantage of the club.

Now for the future, again for the record, the turnover of players (43) was far too great, until the club can reduce this number, lower grades will not achieve the success which the talent suggests they are capable of. The club must decide to adhere to a policy which minimises team changes due to other than performances, thus preventing the moulding of a TEAM into a winning unit. Further the morale of those regularly playing must suffer and with this performances.

Geoff Mullins, Chris Miller, Grahame Taylor and Simon Wells deserve special mention for their undoubted ability with the bat. Following their experiences this year will proceed to greater performances and more consistent results next year. Congratulations to Steve Tait who bowled well and deserved the trophy. If only Steve could be angry all the time the number of wickets would be doubled. A special congratulations must be also given to Robb Carr for his hat trick and especially his performance after.

John Robertson is one of the best all-rounders to have played with the club and I would suggest one of the best fieldsmen in the club; with further experience he will play far higher grades.

Some players showed great talent but played too few games to consistently build on that ability. Should however they play regularly, the club has the players to win premier-ships.

I would like to thank all who played Fourth Grade for giving of their best and making it a most enjoyable season. Captains of all grades have, to varying degrees, come under indirect criticism throughout the year, in which we are not unique, though more prone to. Members of the club should know there are both informal and formal ways of voicing disapproval. Until we find the creature that can please everyone, all the time, criticism will follow. It is the nature of the game that one person must make many subjective judgements whilst not being infallible.

My special thanks to Ralph Merrell (Slim) for all his help and advice, whilst not having a particularly successful season himself, his contribution to Fourth Grade was invaluable.

Hopefully, next season can see a further improvement to this season and I look forward to 1975-76 where Fourth Grade gain a semi-final place.

FIFTH XI REPORT 1974-75

At the start of this season we set the fifths three tasks -

- 1) To develop younger players for future promotion.
- 2) To provide enjoyable cricket for our members.
- 3) To win the fifth grade competition.

In reviewing the season, I can report satisfaction with our efforts at the first two tasks but must admit to some disappointment at our failure to qualify for the semis, a pre-requisite for achieving success at the third task.

With regard to the first task, newcomers such as Zabell, Weir and Wiblin produced performances that obviously qualify them for higher grades. Tucker and Horsley, both of whom joined the club late in the season, also showed great potential for the future. Not so new to the Club, but worthy of consideration for promotion in the coming season were Pullen - if fit and able to make use of pre-season practice; Popvich - if he shows more determination with the bat and complements his intelligent swing bowling; Haymet - one of the best all-rounders in our three lower grades. The wealth of young talent here must justify the existence of the fifths even if no mention was made of the improvements we made to Barford's batting.

Our second task concerned enjoyment and it is here that I feel we had outstanding success. Evidence for this could be drawn from many fields. The majority of the team managed to socialise after each match, be it home or away. In fact this side of the team's character led us to run the fifth grade dinner at the conclusion of the season. The spirit in the side was also shown on the field, particularly when we handed out a heavy defeat to finalists St. George. Saints appeared to have us in trouble when their third wicket fell at 112. After agreeing at lunch that an effort was required, the next 7 wickets were removed for 41. At 2-14 plus one injured we were again in strife when Coolican produced 68 runs in 75 mins, the partnership yielding 128. This ability to come back from poor positions became a trademark of the fifths and allow us to boast that we only lost 6 matches. The inference here of course is that a team that enjoys its work must have both team and social spirit.

Initial task 3 is a little harder to report upon. During the competition proper, i.e. pre-semis, we won 5 matches (one straight), lost 5 (one outright) and had 5 with no result. For 70% of the competition we were placed in the first four but over the Xmas-New Year break four of our losses incurred. Three of these losses were directly attributable to commencing matches with badly balanced teams. On a number of occasions we were forced to ask off-spinner Wiblin to open the bowling (which he did with some success on occasions). However, this lack of balance came about because of people withdrawing from higher grades, and, what was a minor disruption higher became a major disaster by the time it hit us. As we

were always within a first innings win of fourth place, this series of losses (one by 3 runs) cost us our place in the semis and the resultant pennant rightfully ours.

In such a report, mention must be made of one particular match. After some repartee between fives and fours, the fours were invited to back their words up by deeds upon the green sward with the prize being one large team-sized container of refreshments. As a result, the fours found themselves invited to bat upon a perfect batting pitch one Sunday morning. However the pace of Weir, the guile of Wiblin and the fielding of James and Wright saw them fold for 117. During the interval a torrential down-pour changed the conditions completely. The fearless fifts though, were undeterred and guided by the blazing blades of Sarford, Tucker and James weathered the terrors of Tait and the magic of Harrell to record a 5 wicket victory. It was noted that certain other teams would not respond to like repartee.

In brief then, this was a great season for those of us playing regularly in the fifts. As captain, I feel I must thank the hordes of people who filled in for us over the season. In particular the sixth graders who came on short notice to help out and always fitted in so well. A result of this co-operation is the boast that never one did we fail to field a full team - there are not many clubs can match that in their fifts. Special thanks to Roger March who was responsible for arranging these replacement players and never let us down. Jim Finn was a regular replacement player and in fact asked to become our permanent 12th man-scorer. Knowing Jim would be at the ground was so valuable so often in last minute team adjustments that he must receive my award of club-member of the year.

Finally a word of thanks to the vice-captain for most of the season and skipper for a couple of matches, Jim Dormon. Whilst this was not Jim's best season with the bat, he more than made up for it with his wise counsel and support throughout the season. In fact a lot of the spirit mentioned earlier was due to Jim and a few members of the old guard such as Geoff. Wright and the inimitable J.B. (when freed from 3rds).

SIXTH GRADE REPORT

Bruce Norton scored 28 against St. George Veterans, but had a poor season apart from that, frequently falling to very good balls and some bad umpiring. Pat Thompson topped the averages, helped by some not outs.

Bowling-wise the team was inconsistent but better than the batting and at its best did very well. Poor fielding in this grade, especially catching, doesn't encourage the bowlers but they soldiered on anyway with Andrew Whitchurch having the best average. Unfortunately, Andrew left us at the end of session, a pity, because he showed great promise. Mark Pullen, in the two games he played in sixth grade was an example of a bowler who suffered. On his day Mark can be fast and hostile, and against Northern Suburbs Rugby Club he was. He picked up four wickets, had catches dropped off his bowling, and most of the runs hit off him were edges past slips. Unfortunately, Mark had to withdraw from the attack and a game we should have won was lost, Northern Suburbs getting by with one wicket in hand. Stan Livingstone deceived twelve batsmen with his guile in the air, but the hero of the season, bowling-wise, was our only award-winner Ken Schofield. Ken has had a lot of trouble finding the right time for his bowling, his big in-swingers frequently passing airlessly outside the leg stump. However, against Old Knox Grammarians with a slight cross-wind blowing, Ken finally found his time and the batsmen found him unplayable, Ken ending up with 7/23 and a bowling trophy. Dave Kitchins, in the two games he played with us showed some potential and Rob Carr, in his only game against Gordon Veterans, took 5/28 off 8 overs, this being vital to our win.

Of the six games decided, the team should have won four, instead of two. Against Northern Suburbs Rugby Club, the pressure was relaxed after we had them at our mercy, although losing Mark Pullen was unfortunate, they made a fifty run partnership, and crept past us with one wicket in hand. Wondescripts should have been another victory. After bowling them out for 93, we thought we had the game in the bag, but hopeless batting lost us the match, being dismissed for 71. The Waverley match was washed out, just as we were starting to get wickets after they had made a good start. Still the troubles remain. We must have a regular team. Although we played only seven fixtures, 41 players took part - almost enough for four teams. The old chestnut of the captain, Stan Livingstone, asking the players before the match who did what, continued, not helping the team develop as a unit, nor very conducive to team spirit, except among those who had been with the club for some time and already knew each other. Yet the side improved over the previous seasons performance and provided the players are available, there is no reason why this improvement should not continue.

INTERVARSITY 1974-75

(A) The General Scene :

The tone of this year's Intervarsity was shown at the very outset when Jim Robson was caught by the authorities at Sydney Airport after "failing" the metal detector test. His ultimate acquittal as a hijacker. (It appears that the metal foil on chewing gum and chocolate gives a similar reading to a revolver) was timely since Jim was to play an important part in the Final victory.

The plane trip was uneventful. Geoff Kirkwood amused himself with comics and scotch as well as entertaining the hostesses with a rather crude form of origami. Their embarrassment was only matched by the unsuspecting passengers who found Paddy's imitation of a plane nosediving a little disturbing considering the water below. These events proved the turning point. Paddy Grattan-Smith and Mark Ray "cleaned up" the remainder of the side in a sensational collapse which saw their last 8 batsmen fall for 15 runs. A somewhat lucky win, perhaps in view of our batting form but brilliant, surely, with respect to our bowling.

(2) U.N.S.W.C.C. - V.s. - U.O.C.C.

Same story - slightly different actors - a lot less sweat.

Another batting collapse on a good wicket with only Ray, Chapman, Martel, Robson and Grattan-Smith reaching double figures with the highest score being 20. Where the batsmen failed against New England against persistent nagging bowling, they succumbed to Queensland against an extremely penetrating swing attack aided by a humid atmosphere. Mark Ray was to use this later in the day in an unbelievable personal performance which made headlines the next morning (7 overs, 2 maidens, 7 runs, 6 wickets). No batsman had any control over his late swing. Special mention should also be made of Dave Barbour's keeping in particular and the fielding in general which was first class.

(3) U.N.S.W.C.C. - v.s. - Macquarie Uni.

Macquarie University, which should have been our easiest game put up a tough struggle. Batting first, Macquarie, following a shaky start, took toll of some loose bowling and slack fielding to finish with 140 runs. Our best bowlers were Ray and James. When we batted they were to make every run hard to get with tight bowling and deeply set fields. At 3-23, things did not look very healthy. Rod Zabell was to play sheet anchor in this difficult period whilst Barbour and Kirkwood were to seal the victory with a mixture of good and fortunate batting.

(C) The Final

Always a gripping match between two teams of similar style, viz. tight bowling and fielding backed up by solid but suspect batting.

Jock won the toss (4 out of 4) and N.S.W. batted on a firm pitch in humid conditions. Pijevac (resplendent in a white turban?) marked out his 50 yard run and the contest began. The batting was slow, the bowling tight and the fielding deep and defensive. The total of 116 although on the surface modest, was a possibly winning total given the obvious tension and the proven capability of our bowling attack. Robson and Chapman were the mainstays of the batting - Chris showed superb footwork against the spinners whilst Jim played a predominantly leg side game against tight medium pace bowling. He finally succumbed to Mark Ray, who again turned in a fine bowling performance. At 7-67 it was a matter of tight bowling against the tail. Victory came at the score of 80 and was celebrated, after the trophy presentation in the traditional manner.

(D) The Fun and Games :

Undisputed Champions off the field as well as on the field. The boat races were simply no contest. Such hardened performers as Tait, Kirkwood, Grattan-Smith, Farbour left the field sprawling in both 4's and 8's. With only half a dozen females present the tone of the evening soon degenerated and the team were required to repeat the performances for the doubters - another easy victory.
