#### REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Nineteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is presented for your approval.

Five teams represented the Club in 1968-69, one in each of the "A" and "B" Municipal and Shires Competition, two in the south section of the "C" Shires Competition and one in the City and Suburban Competition. The "A" Shires team won the Minor Premiership but was beaten in the final by Roseville Club. The Club Championship was retained for the fifth season in succession. The "B" Shires team finished fifth in its division, three points behind second position. The "CI" Shires team finished seventh out of fourteen teams whilst the "C2" Shires team finished in twelfth position in the same competition. The season was marred to some extent by numerous injuries and illnesses which tended to upset the stability of the individual teams and hinder to a degree the development of teamwork so necessary in any Club.

In Intervarsity competion, matches were played against Newcastle, Flinders, Queensland and Tasmania. Wins were recorded against Newcastle and Tasmania whilst narrow defeats were suffered at the hands of Flinders and Queensland Universities.

Social matches were played against Randwick, Waverley, I Zungari and the "World XI" whilst a trip to Duntroon Military College was one of the highlights of the season.

The Annual Dinner was held on 13th May, and was again a successful function. The Club was honoured to have Guest Speakers, Mr. Arthur Morris, a former international cricketer, to propose the "TOAST TO CRICKET", and former State Cricketer and Captain, Mr. Warren Saunders to respond. Mr. David Walker of Burwood Club proposed the "TOAST TO THE CLUB" to which Mr. Royce Levi replied. The Club Championship Trophy was presented by Mr. Roy Turner, Chairman of the Grades Committee, to Mr. Jim Pratley, Captain of the 1st XI. The Patron, Mr. E. H. Davis, presented the Bursar's Trophy to Mr. Alex Taylor as the season's most successful allrounder whilst Capt. John Morris presented his personal trophy for fielding to David Wills. Capt. Morris also presented a permanent trophy to the Club to record all the winners of his fielding trophy. A new trophy, called the Bar-Turn trophy, presented by Club Members, Mr. Clem Barrington and Mr. Bob Turner, was awarded to Mr. Rob Iucas as the Club's Actor for 1968-69. In all, sixty people attended.

The Committee wishes to thank all those who gave both moral and material support to the Club.

#### SECOND ELEVEN REPORT - 1968/69

Though we surrendered the premiership crown after two years on top, the Second XI nevertheless had a successful season. The team finished a close fifth, and contributed to the Club retaining the Club Championship.

Our congratulations go to Lane Cove, deserved winners of the competition, and commiserations to the luckless Burwood side, who again have to be contented with second place after premiership victory had all but been attained.

With the absence of a number of key players from the side which had triumphed the previous year, the team which took the field for the opening match with Burwood performed credibly, despite its lack of experience, and gave the "ageless" opposition a close game, being beaten on the first innings by only fourteen runs. After good wins over Roseville and Lindfield in succeeding matches, the side experienced a mid-season slump, during which only nine points were earned in four matches, and hopes of reaching the finals faded. However, aided by weaker opposition, and some inspired individual performances, the team was able to win its next four matches, and in so doing, rekindle its premiership aspirations.

The side entered the second last round with the knowledge that a repeat ten-point win over Lindfield would ensure a place in the final against Lane Cove. The fact that this win was not achieved was due, in no small part, to the perfect batting wicket provided by our hosts, from which our bowlers were unable to extract the assistance necessary to dismiss a side twice.

A large turnover of players, brittleness in middle order batting, and a lack of sustained penetration by the fast bowlers - no doubt disheartened somewhat, by numerous missed slips catches, were contributing factors mainly responsible for the team not achieving greater success.

The ground fielding, whilst never rising to any great heights, showed some improvement on previous years, with Frank Graham in particular excelling himself at covers. Just one or two fieldsmen of Frank's calibre can provide a source of inspiration to players of lesser ability, and so improve the fielding performance of the side as a whole. The advantages of having regular specialised slips fieldsmen have rarely been made so apparent as in the past season. Numerous vital catches were spilled, and important early breakthroughs lost. Close-to-the-wicket fieldsmen have to learn that only by applying one hundred per cent concentration can catching be improved to an acceptable level.

Turning to individuals, Daryl Smith was, without doubt, the promotion success of the season. Coming to the side after the fifth round, Daryl had a quiet baptism with useful scores of 17 and 18 in his

first two games. He then revealed his true value as a solid opener with scores of 39, 45, 33 n.o., 56, 115 n.o., 22 and 16 n.o., at the same time breaking the hearts of the opposition bowlers in the true "Lucas" tradition. Bob Charlton, another newcomer, revealed all-round ability with enterprising innings of 62 n.o., and 43 against Canterbury, and 53 against Pennant Hills. Earlier in the season, he captured 6/14 against Roseville. Other stylish innings were played by Mike Reidy - 67 against Lane Cove, Dave Brady - 66 against Roseville, and Jock Martel - 50 against Burwood in his initial match. Chris Relton, apart from some useful scores early in the season, did not reveal his true ability with the bat, but nevertheless showed his value as an all-rounder, capturing 21 wickets at 15.3 with his sharp off-spin, including 5/17 against Roseville. Rob Lucas was unable to recapture his form of previous years during his short season, but doubtless will make amends in the near future.

The bowling honours went to Bob Turner, whose persistent accuracy, together with subtle variation in pace and flight, proved the downfall of many good batsmen. In only four seasons with the Club, Bob has now taken 165 wickets at an average of 14 - a meritorious effort. Geof Garland, back from overseas, showed that he had lost none of his former skill, taking 25 wickets at a cost of 8.6 runs apiece, in the last four matches. His figures of 6/10 against Ryde, and 9/53 in two innings against Bexley were match winning performances. Both Ray Bayfield and Phil Schofield, now not as fast as in former years, nevertheless moved the ball about as few bowlers in the competition can do. Their figures suffered because they often did too much with the ball bowled to batsmen who were not sufficiently skilled to get an edge. Generally speaking, too much of the new ball was wasted by bowling wide of the off-stump, and the fast bowlers would have been more successful had they persistently attacked the stumps.

The onerous position behind the stumps was capably handled by Clem Barrington and Ron Quinn. Clem's wealth of experience and gamesmanship were sorely missed in the latter half of the season. Ron proved himself an able substitute, and took some great catches. Both keepers had their moments with the bat. Ron's 43 against Ryde assured the side of an innings victory, while Clem, with an unconquered 41 against Auburn, combined with Bob Turner (25) in one of the Club's most remarkable partnerships.

New players who impressed, though for one reason or another played only a few games, were Jock Martel, George Preston, Frank Graham, Max Bishop, and Peter Whalon. Each has the ability to develop into a fine player in the coming season.

Lastly, I would like to thank all team members for their support throughout the season, making my task as Captain not only enjoyable, but relatively easy, and particularly Bob Turner for his assistance and advice as Vice-Captain.

#### THIRD ELEVEN REPORT

Prophetically, at the start of the season, one of the selectors voiced the opinion that the thirds would not repeat their performance of 1967-68, when we finished second in our Division.

Events were to prove this seer's forecast to be correct.... we dropped from second to seventh.... but where his forecast was based on the assumption that the team was not of the same calibre as the previous season .... this was not the main reason for our demise.

Consider the record .... after five rounds we were clear leaders... after eight we were lying third within comfortable striking distance .... then the rot set in.

It is my contention that had the team been able to retain a stable nucleus of players we would have finished at least third, and this is no disgrace when one considers that both Southern Districts and Wentworthville would be capable of giving any 'A' Shires team a very competitive game. But, over a majority of rounds we averaged five changes of membership per game, thirty-six players appeared for us and the sense of team spirit declined with each fixture.

It was not the fault of the selectors who did the best they considered they could with the available material .... the main trouble was that so much of the material was unavailable for both ordinary and extraordinary reasons.

The senior grades were beset, at times, with illness and injury.... ordinary unavailability certainly, and more of it than usual. They, and subsequently the lower grades also met with more of the other type, usually notified on Friday nights - the people unavailable because they were - playing golf - wooing birds - or just not giving a reason. There was a new gorgon also ... members (?) unavailable because they were too involved with Saturday morning cricket in matting wicket competitions. And if players are giving preference to such cricket there is something wrong with this club.

There is something wrong when players are only informed of where they are playing on Friday nights .... something wrong when they feel they can become unavailable for reasons which indicate keenness and loyalty to the club have been lost .... something wrong when they turn up at 1 p.m. for a 10 a.m. start .... something wrong when a team is not informed of where it is playing .... something wrong when lower grades defy the club's administration and leave upper grades short of players .... something wrong when such matters are drawn to the attention of the committee, some of who then actually voice opinions to the effect that these matters are unimportant.

Some of these things did not happen to the thirds ... but they happened in this club and are relevant to the almost universal nosedive the club's performances took after the New Year. The incoming committee must make one of its primary aims communication .... so that every member of the club knows what is going on .... and knows it early.

Fortunately, the performances of individuals in the various matches saved the season for this team. One recalls the fighting partnership between Max Bishop and Daryl Smith, which enabled us to defeat Cumberland ... the magnificent century by Peter Newman followed up by an equal bowling performance by Peter Street which gave us the edge against St.George I ... Bob Charlton's nerveless innings against time when we beat St.George III outright off the last ball of the fifteenth over .... George Preston's consistent ability to make batsmen play for the wrong movement of his medium paced seamers ... the transformation of Phil Schofield from a medium pacer to an off spinner who should make next season's selectors very thoughtful.

Those two stalwarts, Duncan and Dormon, who repeatedly propped our sagging batting deserve special mention. Ian Duncan, at number 3, rarely missed double figures and became a member of the '1000 run' club during the season. Jim Dormon usually provided a sound opening. His two innings of 41 at Wentworthville under almost hopeless conditions deserved better support from his team-mates, although I wish he would learn either to hit his square cut hard, or forget all about the shot. For some reason he failed in the seconds, batting for long periods but not scoring runs.

The individual 'turn' of the season was, however, provided by Peter Street. He has for many years earned the reputation as being a batsman who could bowl two or three pacey overs at the end of which he would be finished. Not so last season. Concentrating on bowling, he was the attack's mainstay and earned his eventual promotion by good thoughtful bowling. With remarkable consistency he was never wicketless and in direct contrast to previous years never wanted a rest.

There were also the promising performances of George Preston, Barry Wenke and Max Bishop, all of whom missed a large part of the season due to their return to country and interstate homes over the Christmas vacation.

We, as a club, have set ourselves the highest standard through the nature of our performances over past seasons. We have the quality players to maintain these performances, both those in senior grades and those in this team who displayed the potential to really come good. This report has been written in a critical vein to draw attention to the fact that if administration/player and player/administration relationships are allowed to deteriorate as partially happened last year, our built up standard of performance will collapse.

#### FOURTH ELEVEN REPORT

For the 4th XI the 1969 Season was very similar to the previous Season, with a marginal improvement in our batting. Bowling and fielding let us down, it was in these aspects of the game that we failed, not even measuring up to the standards of past 4th XI teams.

Whilst results were poor, we can truthfully report that the spirit, enthusiasm and enjoyment of the team, particularly the more regular members, was high - even in the face of numerous defeats.

The talent and ability shown at various times of the Season by different players, indicated that the 4th XI can greatly improve its position and overall results. We can and will do a lot better but, firstly, several problems have to be overcome, namely the great turnover of players and fielding at all times eleven players.

A team nucleus is needed, upon which to build, so that batsmen may improve in a set batting order, field placing and bowling may blend with the fielding and other bowlers. We seem to suffer from exams, holidays and loss of continuity, too large are the breaks during the Season. Reducing the large turnover of players and being able to establish and build on a core should be the objective, then the 4th XI will improve greatly and thus benefit the club. We appear to be losing the fact that each team acts as a reserve for higher grades.

The team enjoyed some sort of success during the Season, particularly the last few games, winning two outright. The outright victory over Wests was due largely to some excellent bowling by speedster George Erdos, and two aggressive innings from Ern Mitchell, who scored 55 not out in the 1st innings and 32 not out in the 2nd, when 52 runs were required in 30 minutes.

Although defeated outright by Cumberland, the team turned in a pretty fair effort in the circumstances, considering the difficult wicket at the old Kings School Ground and the fact that we fielded only 8 men. Peter James and Chris Polhill batted soundly in both innings of this match, but the best individual performance was that of fast bowler George Erdos, and although capturing only a couple of wickets for 70 odd runs, bowled unchanged for 20 overs and was still able to extract life from the wicket in his 20th over - this was indeed one of the most outstanding performances of the Season.

The Season ended on a bright note with an outright victory over a somewhat depleted Macquarie University, Chris Polhill contributing an aggressive 81.

Alan Thomas showed great versatility throughout the Season as acting wicket-keeper, but his fielding was an example to the rest of the team, taking a record 10 catches - if only this were the average standard of fielding.

Peter Whalen, a wicket keeper from Gunnedah, played in one match with the 4th XI and showed enough ability behind the stumps and with the bat to be quickly promoted to higher grades. He will, no doubt, be an asset to the Club next Season. Another newcomer, Chris Polhill, although playing in only the last few games, scored 171 runs at an average of 34; he too shows great promise and should be one of the successes of next Season.

It is also hoped that next Season the 4th XI will have only one Captain who can mould and lead a winning team. Both our thanks go to all the members of the 4th XI for an enjoyable Season, and we look forward to the forthcoming Season.

#### U.N.S.W.C.C. 5th Xl Team Report 1968-9

The 1968-69 Cricket Season saw the 5th Xl get away to a solid and promising start, winning four of the first six matches. This effort was due to two main factors: the first being the depth in numbers in the Club, and the second to the enthusiasm of those actually playing. As always happens, however many players left the teams after and during examinations, and of course the "Fighting Fifths" were the first team affected. Most of the strength was quickly promoted to the higher grades, but with the exception of five occasions when 9 or 10 players comprised the team, a full team was fielded for each game.

Though a new team was organised each week, team spirit was generated by a core of players who played nearly every week. Their spirit and enjoyment of the game encouraged new recruits to turn out with us again, and members are already looking forward to the next season.

Cricketers often tend to look upon the City and Suburban fixtures as social cricket with little or no competitive spirit. Nothing could be further from the truth! Having played 4th Grade competition myself from time to time, I feel that I am qualified to say that allowing for the slightly higher class exhibited by most of the C&S teams (less condition of course!), the sense of competition is at least as strong as 4th grade Shires competition. Indeed some of the older, more experienced opposing captains take the game extremely seriously. This experience of "pressure tactics" etc., is good from the point of view that, although "social" cricket, there are no easy runs and wickets for the taking. Hence promoted players are better adjusted for actual competition games.

Of course the social aspects of the games should not be overlooked and many players who could only play the odd afternoon found themselves getting home at rather late hours - and not due to travelling time either!

Considering the chopping and changing of the team each week, the 5th performed quite well in the circumstances winning 6 of the 19 games, and narrowly losing 5 more (due to either missing one or two



players, or lack of a wicketkeeper with some experience, etc.)

The season was punctuated with some creditable performances and antics e.g. Iverack's cavalierish 99, Hook's freakish 5/16 with the <u>new</u> ball, Heher's over of 14 balls, Allen's non-bouncing bumper, Schofield's uncontrollable inswinger and Stockley's anguish at missed stumpings. There were other performances worth mentioning too but they would really have to be seen to be believed.

On the whole the 5th Xl players would, I think, look back on the season with an overall sense of enjoyment spiced here and there with the feelings which only cricketers can experience. I hope to see many of the old faces and a good many more new faces in a still-more-successful season of C&S Cricket in 1969-70.

The second day belonged to Andrews. Playing a limited variety of strokes off the back foot, he hit only six boundaries, but kept the score mounting rapidly with expertly placed shots and quickly run singles - often to the distress of his partners.

Wills departed early on the Monday in characteristic fashion after having struck four boundaries. Herbert, whilst overshadowed by Andrews played a good innings in their partnership of 115. Another good innings was provided by Pocock, highlighted by powerful driving on the off-side. Graham completed the first half of an unenviable "double" before Wilson, with the second new ball, enticed Andrews; Mendl accepting his third catch behind the wicket. Pratley and Robinson then added 49 in rather slow time for the eighth wicket, before the stylish Robinson, after delighting all with his cultural backlift, missed a straight delivery and was bowled by Hanley. Pratley soon improved the slow left-arm spinner's figures further and the innings closed at a seemingly formidable 352.

The Newcastle openers, however, were not over-awed and with aggresive strock-play took the score to 77 without loss in the remaining hour's play. Of the six bowlers tried, none enthused, the usually dangerous Jones having 28 runs struck from his four overs.

#### 3RD DAY

The final day proved an anti-climax.

Tarbox added only 3 to his overnight score when, with the score at 82, he was bowled by an outswinger from Jones. Hanley and Thompson then scored very slowly until the former was completely beaten by Robinson's second ball in a belated second spell, and was leg-before for a competent half-century. An off-cutter from the same bowler

removed Thompson fifteen runs later and from that stage it was only a matter of time before the remainder of the team succumbed to the hostile swing bowling of Jones. Grennan, Smith and Mendl abdicated before Cole removed the aggressive Davidson; but, after bowling two wides in the following over, the mercurial leg-spinner was "rested". Jones removed the "tail" with the second new ball, taken at 239, and UNSW had gained hard fought first innings win after an atrocious fielding display in which "over a dozen" chances had been missed.

The bowling had been persistent, Jones and Robinson sharing the honours with Cole an accessary after the fact.

UNSW then batted out time against an attack which was consistent only in its originality. In an inconsequential innings, Graham completed a "pair" in his first Intervarsity match by deflecting Davidson to Grennan at slip and Pocock played intelligently and, then with each stroke, showed what an under-estimated batsman he is.

Perhaps the highlight of the last day was provided by Andrews in playing his only scoring shot for the match in front of the wicket. He later (four balls) succumbed to Mendl who "stole" the bowling honours. The ubiquitous Robinson was "padded-up" but was not required to bat.

#### UNIVERSITY OF N.S.W. v FLINDERS UNIVERSITY

#### Played at ADELAIDE 6-8 JANUARY, 1969

A team of twelve players made the trip from Sydney to Adelaide for our inaugural match with Flinders University. The journey itself was, to say the least, depressing. The efficiency of the government railways leaves a lot to be desired and Barry Andrews must have previously savoured their hospitality when he decided to motor down. The monotonous boredom of the journey was relieved to some extent by Alan Ridley's Card School and like all good proprietors he made a handsome profit. However, the cricket itself, the wonderful hospitality of our openents and the beauty of Adelaide made it all worthwhile in the end.

Flinders University nestles in the foothills surrounding Adelaide. It is an institution of three years standing and is fortunate in having superb playing fields overlooking the city itself.

The first morning of the match arrived and the two captains went forth to toss. Unfortunately Pratley called incorrectly and this ineffect decided the match. Sent in to bat on a damp wicket we performed poorly and could but muster 122 runs. Only a dour innings of 37 from Harry Herbert and some forceful hitting by Dave Wills saved us from ignominity. Alistair Douglas contributed most to our downfall with a fine exhibition of controlled medium pace bowling in which he took 4 wickets for 41 off 25 overs.

Flinders commenced their first innings twenty minutes before stumps and adjourned at the close of play with all wickets intact. The second days play saw Flinders gain a first innings lead of 87, due mainly to a hard hitting innings of 93 by their opening batsman Andrew Bishop. We contributed most to the deficit with an uninspiring performance in the field in which a number of catches were missed and lapses in ground fielding prevalent. At one stage our openents were 5 for 186, however steady bowling by Pratley and Emery coupled with some indifferent batting enabled us to take the final five wickets for only 21 runs.

Our second innings began just prior to tea. We were immediately in trouble when Harry Herbert, here of the first innings was dismissed without a run on the board. Hopkins joined Emery and together they took the score along to 41 before Hugh was adjudged l.b.w. A mild collapse then took place until Andrews and McEachran came together to see play through to stumps during which time the first innings deficit was erased.

We started the final day with our score 4-111. With the exception of a solid innings of 37 by Jim Pratley the remaining batsmen offered little resistance and we finished with the modest total of 193.

Flinders needing 112 for the outright win began well enough and reached 22 before losing their first wicket. However, wickets then fell at regular intervals until with an hour left for play they were 5 for 79. At this stage we were right back in the game. Our bowling and fielding in this innings was inspired and I feel that if we had applied ourselves in the same way throughout the match we must surely have won. In the end however, Flinders obtained their target for the loss of only one more wicket.

So we lost, but we were far from disgraced and cur final effort was one that all eleven players should be proud of. This was a wonderful game of cricket which augurs well for future contests between the two universities.

Our hosts right royally entertained us and I only hope we can return the compliment in Sydney next season. In conclusion many thanks to all the members of the team for making my job as manager such an easy one.

# UNIVERSITY OF N.S.W. V UNIVERSITY OF TASMANIA.

After excellent hospitality afforded the University of NSW the previous season in Tasmania, the clash at Kensington on 12th -14th January, 1969, was eagerly awaited. Tasmania won the toss and decided to bat. A wicket with the second ball of the match by pace bowler Max Jones provided him with the first of seven he was to take in the innings. It also marked the first of seven catches in the match to keeper Ron Quinn who gave a superb performance of wicket keeping. Greig Robinson bowled well to take 5-37 from 12 cyers, whilst Max Jones took 3-12 also from 12 overs including 6 maidens.

At 2 for 18 the 102 runs needed for victory seemed a difficult target for the home side but Phil McEachran (39 n.o.) and David Wills (48 n.o.) saw it through and UNSW had won by 8 wickets in two days.
