

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The Twenty-Eighth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of N.S.W. Cricket Club is hereby presented for your approval and adoption.

The 1977/78 season was a successful season both for the Club and the University, and certainly consolidated our remarkable achievements of last season. Whilst not achieving to ultimate premiership, the club did show a worked improvement in the lower grades, giving us a strengthened base to build on in the future seasons.

First Grade achieved a very commendable third place and perhaps with more favourable weather better things may have eventuated, but to win a bronze after last years premiership win in this class of cricket is a fine effort. Congratulations to John Rogers and the First Grade side.

The clubs congratulations certainly go to Terry Buddin and his Second Grade side for a fine Premiership victory, truely won and earned by some excellent preformances and fine captaincy. Again as last year, a young side has been moulded into a strong cohersive unit upon which the club can build for the future. Competition for the Higher grades should be very keen next season.

Third Grade finished 11th and with some luck could have made the semifinals, however, they provided the necessary back up and support for the 1st and 2nd XI.

Fourth Grade finished 11th, a marked improvement on the previous year and at Christmas certainly looked like semi-finalist, unfortunately the post holiday results did not come. As with all lower grades, Fourth Grade are at the other end of the selection process.

Our first Fifth Grade side were disappointing and never showed their full potential, however, the second Fifth Grade side played far above their anticipated capacity and were successfull in reaching the Final, a tribute to the players and John McFarlane's leadership. Unfortunately, as last season the final victory elluded the Fifth Grade again, after being so close during the match.

The rearranged programme introduced last year for C & S continued this season and maintained the success and popularity of the arrangement. The C & S programme whilst not a competition, gave valuable match practise and selection guide for many players.

The Poidevin-Gray Shield team did not emulate the fine win of the previous season, but did play well having 1 win, 2 draws and 2 losses.

The committee feels that the Poidevin-Gray Shield competition should be reviewed and extended to under 25 years of age, with more playing dates, using it as a further selection guide for representative honours.

Special mention should be made of the fine assistance and encouragement given the Club by the University through our Patron, the

Vice Chancellor, Prof. R. Myers; Sports Association, Student Amenities and the Ground Staff — for all themr help — many thanks.

The Club took a further step in establishing itself in Sydney Grade Cricket with the selection of two players, Greg Watson and Geoff Lawson in the N.S.W. Sheffield Shield Team. Their preformances certainly justified selection and to both players — Congratulations.

Socially the club enjoyed it best soason ever, with numerous well attended functions culminating in the Annual Dinner again the high-light of the season. The return to the University as a venue for our Dinner was justifies and well over 100 people attended; our guest of honour was Mr. David Lord, commentator, publisher and entreprenuer, who helped to make this a most enjoyable function. I would like to thank the management of the Union and club members for all their assistance in making this event such a success. The club hopes that now we may re-establish a traditional link for our Annual Dinner with the University Union. The club was further honoured to have for the first time, the Chancellor, Mr. Justice Samuels attend and contribute to the evening and it is hoped that a tradition has been established for the club.

Due to the success of the Social events during the year, the club raised a significant amount of money which was used as a subsidy to send 16 players to New Zealand. Whilst being a new endeavour, our tour to N.Z. during the new year helidays proved an overwhelming success and should become a feature of every season, and the club hopes to expand the numbers of tours, tourists and venues.

1976/77 saw the number of Blues Winners increase to 22 with awarding of a Blue in Cricket to Greg Watson and Chris Chapman, to both congratulations.

Unfortunately, little progress has been made towards one of the clubs aims, namely; the addition of a club house type facility on campus. The addition of a floor to the Sam Cracknell Pavillion as the most successful location of such a facility. As the expenditure involved is considerable, however necessary, efforts are continuing along this line.

Financially, the club had a sound and profitable year mainly due to the support of all club members and club supporters at the various social functions and financial endeavours. From the balance sheet (enclosed), the volume of monies handled this year increased considerably to past years, due to the above. The club again thanks Ralph Merrell, for all his work in keeping the enterprise afloat and progressing.

Special mention and thanks go to Courage Australia, The Rural Bank and N.S.W. Sports Store for their particular help and assistance over the past year, and we look forward to a continuing association in the future.

Many people gave of their time and energy to make this year the success that it was both on and off the field. To all, many thanks. I would like to acknowledge the efforts of our Secretary, Jill Ratcliffe, her

enthusiasm and capacity for work are a major reason for the success of our social and other functions.

I would also like to thank my fellow members of the committee for a most productive year and all their help in making the club and system function so well and smoothly,

We now look forward to the 1978-79 season, with confidence, knowing we have consolidated on past achievements, ready to progress to new levels of success and achievements.

FIRST GRADE REPORT 1977 - 1978

1977-78 was a fine year, disappointing because of a semi final washout that meant elimination, some setbacks courtesy of badly timed bouts of "Dropsy" - but never dull, some incredible highs, and a last min-bending performance, as a prelude to the March Monsoon making a mockery of the finals.

Our '77 Premiership Pennant was proved no fluke, two players broke into the State side, on occasions we played exhibarating cricket, our young batsmen matured, our success rubbed off onto the Seconds whose turn it was to win a Premiership - yes a good year!

Greg Watson's elevation to the State Team was great news. In that side, he was mostly third or fourth paceman, upwind, old ball, stockbowling; but the effort was there and so might have been the results, if only he hadn't suffered the majority of the State team's dropped catches. Importantly, he proved he was a cricketer and one of courage, and a bright future is assured.

Predicting him as a State man at the Season's beginning got little support, but predicting Geoff Lawson as his partner - and downwind at that - required psychic powers. Once Lawson's no-balling problem was solved - he simply put his foot 12 inches behind the line, his improvement was pradigious. In Round Five, his first game as spearhead, he demolished Sydney Uni, and within half a dozen games, his selection generated impressive reviews, and with the three current test bowlers, Thomson, Clark and Callen, all with injury problems, the Chances for he and Watson are considerable. In the field and with the bat, both showed flair and know-how, reflecting favourable credit on the Club.

Yet the Season started appallingly. Four sitters dropped before Pennant raising at afternoon to a on the first day, and a dismal batting display chasing 300 against Mosman meant a resounding firstup loss.

We thought we'd redeemed ourselves against Balmain. By 3 O'clock, Lewson and Watson had skittled the first four batsmen for 28, after our for 18 closure an hour earlier, (five minutes before halfway). With almost three hours left, Balmain played for a draw, - and, on that plumb Drummoyne Pitch, got it easily, despite our frenzied efforts. "as Premiers you must expect it!" was their reasoning but a few Balmain greats must have turned in their graves!

The Skipper's turned a disastrous 6 for 60 in 2% hours into a respectable 225 against Northern Districts, but a wet ball, slippery approaches, rain and darkness took their toll in an all-or-bust finish and we busted, by 3 wickets.

North Sydney got out of jail - from 8 for 129 to 229 all out. At ten
next week at 3 for 119 we looked in good shape, but a sudden electrical
storm meant long handle stuff - and the wickets tumbled to 8 for 153
before the washout.

So, four games, no points, stone motherless last - whatever happened to last year's cocksure Premiers?

With Watson in the State Side, Lawson took over as spearhead and put the cleaners through Sydney Uni, rolling them for 100 after we struggled to 228 all the first day. Our quick declaration gave them 164 in 123 minutes and finally 8 runs in 2 overs with 5 wickets left. Incredibly, Grattan-Smith bowled last man Pyke last ball of the day for 10 outright points when 2 runs meant a Sydney Uni outright win (6 points to them 6 to us) one run meant a tie (3:9) no runs meant a first innings win to us(0:6).

Gordon's legendary tail rescued them from 7 for 118 to 209 all out - with a bit of help from the Umps - whereupon they demolished us for miserable 113. Despite our 8:1 field (with which Robson got his only wicket for the season) they were reductant to try for outright points (much to their ultimate regret) and the game fizzled out.

Two days at Marrylands in 100 dagree heat got us our second win, highlighted by O'Brien's 20 off a Lothian over in his excellent 70 out of 278 for 9, 77 too many for Cumberland. Superb cricket till tea in a one day match against Waverley, went down the plughole when thanks to poor catching (even Chapman!) Waverley recovered from 3 for 23 to pass our 6 for 201 with the loss of only two more wickets. The reinstated Martel had given us a great start with a sizzling 64.

Our-gloomy Christmas was not improved by a rain interrupted New Year one-day game at St. George who when played was finally abondoned were 7 for 124 chasing our 168, our last 6 wickets falling for 15 runs in a frantic effort to make up for lost time after superb innings from Chapman and Livingstone.

So, five matches to go and we're 13th - out of the running we thought - but you never know!!

At tea on the second day with a miserable 5 for 82 in 160 minutes, chasing our first day 262 (thanks to a Martel-Ray 93 opening stand), Sutherland were in a spot. In fourth place, but needing 6 points to stay there, they opted for outright points. Their closure and our second innings forfeit left them 181 to get in 151 minutes, but they lost their last wicket with 3 balls left and 56 runs short. A good game and 10 valuable points to us.

We struggled home against Manly in a wet Australia Day Game after rolling them for 77. A Mark Ray special this game, following up his 6 wickets for 29 with 34 not out, assisted by Watson's power laden 27 which got us home from 6 for 35 without further loss.

A depleted Wests were no match managing 148 in dreadful fashing (Watson and Lawson conceding only 23 runs in 26 overs) after our dashing 9 for 289-the first 4, Ray, Martel, Chapman and Robson all in the runs.

In three games we have jumped to third - the critics and fans are incredulous, and to cap it, Lawson joins Watson in the State Team.

We get 258 against Petersham (Livingstone and Robson are superb), but in a re-run of last year's final - we lose! Their last wicket scrambles the 12 required despite new quickle Perger's 5 wickets for 70, but oh, those dropped catches!

Back we go to seventh with one game to go, playing Bankstown who are thire.

Sent in on a wet day we played superbly to reach 224 on a ground so heavy we managed only 3 fours. Robson is outstanding with 76, but Pym's 29 is invaluable. The strong Bankstown batting cumbles before the Grattan-Smith/Ray spin, and at 5 for 38 in 91 minutes, Bankstown "Do a Sutherland" and try for cutright points. Their declaration and our forfeit leaves them 187 to get in 205 minutes. At 1 for 71 they looked good, but marvellous fielding and good spin bowling take their tell, and 17 minutes from time and 40 runs to spare, we have ten points and number three spot in the semifinals.

To Mosman for the semi, with Watson and Lawson back, the money is swinging our way. But 10 inches of rain prevent us getting on the field and under the rules the higher placed team, Mosman (2nd) go through to the finals - only to have a similar experience at the hands of Randwick - a dreadful finish to the season.

So far the third straight year, the firsts have started poorly and finished like a house on fire.

Spinners, Ray and Grattan-Smith averaged 15 wickets at 26 runs each up to the New Year. From then on they recorded respectively, 22 at 13, and 18 wickets at 11. Ray ran up 180 runs at 45 per innings, whilst Robson scored 201, Chapman 113 and Livingstone 97 in the last three games.

Yet the batting throughout the year was much more reliable than before. First, the spin bowling, then the fielding and pace attack have achieved real first grade standard but the question mark over the batting now seems a thing of the past. The brittleness has gone, and in its place, a sensible, realistic approach has developed, allowing us to build big scores as well as fight rearguard actions.

The authority Jim Robson showed in Poidevan-Gray last year came through in his last three innings and gives us great hope for the future. Chris Chapman emerged from his introverted, stylised approach and began gathering runs with ease and flair. Greg Livingstone eventually threw off the boy wonder tag, showing all the reflexes, technique and temperament of a class, top-order batsman. Jock Martel's overdue return three times gave the batting a much needed punch (and the opposition quickies nightmares!); and Mark Ray's extraordinary early season setbacks as a Sheffield Shield place beckoned, finally gave way to the old grafting and solidity which, added to his bowling and fielding, demands a place on the interstate scene.

Such batting talent forced a class strokemaker in Peter Tout to spend most of the season in the seconds, whilst Mick Watt, a significant contributor to last season's success, after a poor start, was overwhelmed by a rush of batsmen past him. In the seconds Neville Jansson and Bruce Handley repeatedly turned in performances demanding elevation to the firsts, but had to be content with second grade Premiership caps.

The spin twins, Grattan-Smith and Ray, finished as dominating as the previous year, but struggled initially to capture form. Grattan-Smith's knee injury in England led to an early loss of loop and unaccustomed punishment, whilst Ray's now abundant variety resulted in a temporary accuracy loss, and similar batting disrespect. Yet, Sutherland, Manly, Wests and Bankstown would all vouch for the return to their mesmerising flight and spin.

As fifth bowler, legspinner, Steve Campbell did not get the opportunities his promise demands, but the year's first grade experience should aid his development. Dick Pym's 10 wickets in his 60 overs as replacement quickie were of immense value as was his infectious enthusiasm, and Nigel Perger's five wickets in his one first grade match indicates that, given the right attitude, we have another potential pace bowling star.

Behind the stumps, Jim O'Brien had another fine year, whilst his batting to Christmas was the most consistent in the team. His coaching, encouragement and intelligent cutlook will be missed during his absence in England in the coming scason.

The irrepressible Tom Boyce, was a great help as scorer, Chief organiser, Adviser, Match Report Writer, etc. whilst Jill Ratcliffe and Andrew McMaster (Splinter) were again superb managers, supporters, drink and afternoon tea providers, etc. Our thanks also to Shirley and Betty Chapman for afternoon teas and David Lemmon for help and support for beyond the norm.

The Captain's appreciation goes to many people - Vice Captain Jim O'Brien, fellow selection committee members, Terry Buddin, Clayton Jones, Peter James, Geoff Garland, Club officials, Tony Epstein, Ralph Merrell and Jehn McFarlanc, and for his wise counsel, John Chapman.

SECOND GRADE REPORT

The team's for and against record does not seem on its face to___ be particularly impressive. But as is so often the story. bare figures tell but part of the story. First, by the end of November, after Round 6 we were linguishing near the bottom of the table having already been beaten 4 times including two disastrous outright losses. From then on we won every single encounter, three of them convincing cutright wins, with the exception of a loss to Sutherland Second, We played no draws at all and that was indicative of the attacking manner in which we played the game. It was also in stark contrast to last year's performance in which 5 of our 14 games ended in draws, thus denying us the chance of participating in the semi-finals. Third, we were soldom able to field our strongest side and on those occasions when we did we were rarely in trouble. The team was depleted by the gaps left in the first-grade side by players on Sheffield Shield duty, as well as the customary inquiries and unavailability. Whilst on this question it ought to be pointed out that only 3 players participated in every game, only 6 in all played in 2/3 of all matches and in all 22 different players represented the club in Second Grade. To be successfull it is imperative that a nucleus of players participate in each game. Only then can continuity, team work and a sense of corporate spirit be developed.

Now is the appropriate moment to indicate the indebtediness owed by the team as a whole to the three who did play in each game. Their performances speak for themselves. Neville Jansson in scoring 475 runs was the heaviest run-getter in the side; Roger March was easily the highest wicket taker with 47 wickets, whilst Paul Deegan batted consistently and kept wickets admirably.

Finally a quick look at the averages will reveal that our real struggle lay on the bowling department. The four bowlers who appear first in the averages and aggregate were almost solely responsible for our success in that department and yet they played together in only 3 games out of them being the final.

On March 27 at 6.10 p.m. in fading autumnal light the second grade premiership was won by UNSW when we heat Sydney University outright in the final, thus avenging an earlier heavy loss inflicted by our sister university on us. But six months of grade cricket had preceded that momentous occasion and it may well be worth the attempt to recapture some of the highlights.

Round 1 Vs Mosman Scores: Mosman 7/133 (cl) + 6/138 UNSW 131 + 8/139 Mosman won outright.

We lost the toss and slid from the comparative control of 5/125 to 131 all cut. Dave Pratt showed brilliant early season form to score 58. Dick Pym cut a swathe through the early order batsman to have Mosman realing at 6/65 but they nevertheless managed to pass our score. Our batting in the second innings looked brittle again despite a magnificent forcing innings of (77*) by Jock Martel which enabled us to close our second innings. Mosman scored the winning runs in total darkness in the last over to record a good outright victory.

(Second Grade Report Con .)

Round 2 Vs Balmain: Scores Balmain 7/140 UNSW 138 Balmain won on 1st Innings.

We completed a disastrous weekend by capitulating for the second time in three days. The batting failed again after we had at one stage been 1/65, although it is fair to say that the oppositions fielding was magnificent and at least four superb catches were taken. Our bowling was tight but not particularly penetrative although Bruce Handley helped himself to four wickets.

Round 3 Vs Northern Districts: UNSW 5/355 (cl) + 0/32 N.D. 8/205 (cl) UNSW won on first Innings.

This was our first victory of the year. We won the toss and batted on a flat track. Batting conditions were very easy and we declared at 5.30, Jock Martel slammed 50 in an hour and set the scene for some scintillating batting. Neville Jansson and Bruce Handly put on 126 in 109 minutes before Jansson was out just 8 short of his century. Handley was undaunted and went on to record the highest score reached by a UNSW player in grade cricket. He batted for 197 minutes and hit 19 fours and two sixes. It was a truly magnificent effort. He and Geoff Kirkwood put on 91 in 72 minutes and then with Nigel Perger added 40 runs in the last 15 minutes. Northern Districts struggled for runs the next week and eventually declared at 4 0'clock some 150 runs behind. Dick Pym and Roger March were the best of the bowlers. Our openers slowed 52 off 3 overs as we planned a second innings declaration but unfortunately rain prevented and further play.

Round 4 Vs North Sydney: UNSW 9/190 N. Sydney 189 UNSW won on 1st Innings.

North Sydney recovered from 6/65 and keen 9/133 to reach 189. Steve Van der Sluys, Dick Pym and Roger Narch all bowled well. On 5/55 and again at 6/99 we were in trouble. Bruce Handley continued his good form with a fine 38 and Roger March helped Geoff Kirkwood add 66 for the 7th wicket to ensure a win. The player of the match however was Kirkwood with a technically perfect innings of 68 made in 165 minutes. He kept the premier bowling attack at bay when it threatened to demolish our batting. We completed the victory in a most unusial manner with the winning run coming from a no-ball.

Round 5 Vs Sydney Uni: Syd. Uni 3/156 + 7/65 UNSW 154 + 66 Sydney Uni won outright.

Jock Martel and Mick Watt put on 42 for the first wicket but with the exception of Paul Deegan's 28 n.o. at the end of the innings. There was little resistance to a determined, but not very dangerous attack. Nigel Perger bowled with great pace but the opposition batsmen had little difficulty in securing the required runs for victory. The object of the exercise was to now score runs so that we might force a fourth innings result. Wickets were sacrificed and at ten we were 6/17 on a perfect batting wicket. In a dreadful exhibition of batting we finally to be all out for 66 and Sydney Uni. scored the necessary runs to inflict on us a humiliating defeat.

Round 6 Vs Gordon: Gordon 4/305

UNSW 9/303 (c1)

Gordon won on 1st Innings.

We batted first on a slightly damp wicket and did very well to reach 303 at stumps Neville Jansson (53) & Bruce Handley (66) put on 85 for the third wicket and later Terry Buddin (40) and Roger March (37) dipped in with useful runs. Gordon found our depleted attach very much to their liking on a very easy wicket and a fourth wicket partnership of 197 them cruise to an easy win.

Round 7 Vs Cumberland: UNSW 2/148 (decl) + 0/112 beat Cumberland 141 and 118.

This game represented the turning point in the season, a maich won with ease. It was a victory made all the more surprising in view of our recent incredibly poor form. Cumberland won the toss and batted on an easy paced wicket and at 1/78 their decision to bat appeared to have been vindicated. The introduction of the spin twins, Geoff Kirkwood and Roger March changed the course of the game and between them they took 9 wickets. Jock Martel and Ian Smith flogged the Cumberland attack and added 87 in an hour. Bruce Handley completed the task of achieving victory by hitting a six. Cumberland again collapsed with Roger March and Steve Van der Sluys taking 9 wickets between them then in a magnificent display of power hitting openers Jock Martel and Ian Smith took just over an hour to give us an outright victory by 10 wickets.

Round 8 Vs Waverley: UNSW 6/152 Waverley 147 UNSW won on 1st innings.

In the last game before Xmas, Waverley won the tess and batted. Extremely good pace bowling by Nigel Perger and later by Greg Robinson had Waverley out cheaply. Greg Robinson bowled superbly and capped a fine return second grade by taking a hat-trick. Their used the conditions magnificently and at one stage we were 5/36. Then Neville Jansson and Terry Buddin added 99 for the 6th wicket to steer us to victory. The pair showed great concentration in the face of a determined attack and it was this victory that demonstrated that the side was a premiership threat.

Round 9 Vs St. George: UNSW 2/86 (cl) St. George 84 + 4/83 UNSW won on 1st Innings.

The bowlers again dominated a game affected by rain. Dick Pym and Greg Robinson bowled throughout the St. George Innings to take 5 wickets each they were assisted by superb catching behind the wicket. Mick Watt, Ian Smith and Peter Rous batted well to ensure the first innings points.

Round 10 Vs Sutherland: Sutherland 6/288 UNSW 256 Sutherland won on 1st Innings.

Batting first on an excellent wicket, we stumped from 1/58 to 5/51. Peter Tout and Terry Buddin then added 108 in a brilliant sixth wicket stand and Paul Deegan added a very useful 31 runs at the end. Overnight Sutherland were 3/38. The next weekend the Sutherland batsman assisted by some ordinary bowling and some atrousious catching, coasted an easy victory. At the time this toss seemed disastrous. In retrospect this game was to be the "one bad one" during the climb back.

Round 11 Vs Manly: UNSW 132 Manly 97 UNSW won on 1st Innings.

Batting first on a well track we managed only 132. Runs were hard to come by. Gooff Kirkwood batted for two hours for his 22. Manly were shot out for 97 after a magnificent fourteen over spell of fast bowling by Dick Pym. Greg Robinson and Gooff Kirkwood kept the pressure on the remaining batsman thereafter.

Round 12 Vs Western Suburbs: UNSW 255 Wests 221
UNSW won on 1st Innings.

This was a vital game for Wests were equal second, 3 points ahead of us in 4th place on the table We won the toss and batted. The early batting was tentative and decidedly slow. Peter Tout hammered 45 but was out just before teawith the score 6/115. After it had been 5/76. After ten Terry Buddin thrashed the Wests attack to score 109 his innings lasted 165 minutes and included 11 fours. He and Dick Pym added 57 for the 9th wicket and then he scored 29 of the last wicket partnership of 30 with Greg Robinson. The first innings victory was achieved late on the second day. The bowlers stuck to their task very well in oppressive conditions

Round 13 Vs Petersham: UNSW 9/233 (cl) + 0/0 (cl) Petersham 8/81 (cl) + 109 U.N.S.W. won outright.

Return to bat we were at one stage 1/154. Neville Jansson (84), opening for the first time for the club and Peter Tout (58) added 122 for the second wicket in 144 minutes and batted magnificantly into the bargair. Defensive bowling and field placement restricted run scoring later in the afternoon and wickets fell regularly as quick runs were being pursued. Petersham were progressing quite comfortably at 0/48 but Geoff Kirkwood bowled superbly to capture 5/13 off 12 overs. The Petersham captain then declared his teams innings closed after we forfeited our second innings and set them 153 runs to get in 150 minutes! The task was clearly beyond them despite 3 overs at full-tosses from Davo Fratt for 25 runs. Outright victory was achieved through the efforts of Roger March who claimed 7/55 off 18 consecutive overs. This victory took us to the competition lead.

Round 14 Vs Bankstown: UNSW 176 Bankstown 166 UNSW won on 1st Innings.

Bankstown, placed 4th had to win this game to obtain a herth in the semi-finals. That looked a distinct possibility when they won the toss and inserted us on a damp wicket. Openers Ian Smith (23) and Richard Campbell (32), promoted for his initial second grade game, handled the awkward conditions very well. Wickets fell regularly but through it all Neville Jansson reigned supreme. His 64 in 165 minutes was a masterly effort in the circumstances. Faul Deegan again clipped

in with a useful 28. Overnight Bankstown were 1/15. The second Saturday dawned fine and hot. The attach was totaly depleted and we had only our opening bowler. One of the 3 spinners, John Sands, left at 2.30 for a wedding. Terry Buddin was a passenger as a result of a hamstring injury, despite those slight inconveniences, we achieved an excellent victory, Greg Robinson bowled tight as did Geoff Kirkwood. However the hero at the moment was Roger March whose full analysis was 27/5/6/55 The victory margin was 10 runs but was was achieved only after an eighth wicket partnership of 70 threatened to destroy our hopes of winning. 73 overs, on a flat wicket with a fast outfield with a depleted attack, and to restrict the opposition to 166, was magnificent. It was truly the appropriate manner in which to capture the minor premiership.

And so to the Easter weekend and an historic clash between the two universities, meeting for the first time in a grade final. Semi-finals were abandoned in every grade without a ball being bowled and so minor premiers and runners-up contested the final. Extraordinarily heavy rain during the preceding 10 days was already going to play a part in proceedings. Play was delayed until 1.30 on the first day because of downpours to the area surrounding the pitch. We on a most important toss and Sydney University batted first. Dick Pym and Greg Robinson each took an early wicket but the pitch played slowly and was not conducive to pace. The introduction of Roger March's off-spin produced immediate results as he took wickets with his first two deliveries. Wickets continued to fall regularly and Sydney Uni. were eventually dismissed for 65 scored off 31.5 overs in 144 minutes. Greg Robinsons figures were 9/3/16/3 whilst Roger March bowled very impressibely to record the figures of 10.5 /4/17/6. We had to survive for 1% hours and at stumps we were 2/36 Ian Smith had scored a most valuable 20 runs undefeated when bad light stopped play early. :

Play was resumed on Easter Monday, but only after the start had been delayed for some 1% hours as a result of heavy overnight rain which had affected the pitch and surrounding area. Inn Smith and Roger March, also had gave in as nightwatchman, stayed together until the scores were level. Inn Smith then was discuissed for 38 a gritty and determined innings occupying 136 minutes and including the only two boundaries of the innings. March, who had added 40 with Smith for the third wicket, was out soon after for 20, which was scored in most determined Petersham. Sydney University mediumpacer, Chris MacRae then destroyed the remainder of the U.N.S.W. Innings by maintaining excellent line and length on a pitch which offered him very considerable assistance. We slumped from 2/65 to 105 all out, the only resistance in the latter half of the innings coming from Geoff Kirkwood who occupied the crease for 71 mins, although he scored only 6 runs. Sydney Uni. sensed that our batting collapse left them with a glimpse of Victory. Their batsmen forced the pace and scored 93 for the loss of six wickets in even time before declaring their second innings. Dick Pym took 3/34 whilst Roger March with two and Greig Robinson with one, took the other wickets. This left us with 55 runs to score

in approximately 18 overs to survive in order to secure the premiership. Ian Smith again saw us through the crutial stage of the innings after we had been 2/6. Later Peter Tout dominated proceedings to finish with 30 not out. Two offers from the umpires to the batsmen to abandon play because of bad light were turned down. Admidst high tension Bruce Handley hit the winning runs from the third last ball of the final over in almost total darkness. To win the premiership outright was of sufficient psychological importance in view of the earlier loss to Sydney Uni. and of course indicated the decision not to accept the umpires offer to the light that would have seemed a rather tame way in which to finish the match.

I would like to extend my thanks to a number of people. First, 'to John Rogers whose influence on the direction that the club has taken in the last three years has been obvious for all to see. His organisation of the country week hopefully will see the start of a new trend. That trip together with the New Zealand tour, developed and tightened techniques, both on and off the field and resulted in the discovery of hitherto unrealized linguistic talents in some of the tourists. emergence of characters such as "Egg'n" Pym, "Larry S" March, "Stevic Plinter" McMaster (the man who can fall asleep if he has a steering wheel in his hand) in testimony to that. To Clayton Jones, for his continual support and repeated selection insights. To Jill Ratcliffe and the rest of the committee for their unfailing administrative efforts. To the Handley ladies, Mrs Pratt and Mrs Tout for satisfying our nutritional wants by serving various gastronomic delights at afternoon tea. To Vic the assistant groundsman who enabled us to play at all in the final. Lastly and perhaps most importantly to the ten other players who contributed to the premiership victory and to all players and supporters who have made my three year association with the club so enjoyable.

As Geoff Garland noted last year "what can one say about a season that promised so much yet produced so little?" Again, third grade fell short of their capabilities and turned in a mixture of fine performances (especially in the field) and dismal displays (especially with the bat). Our bowlers worked very hard indeed and put us into good positions many times. However, our batting let us down especially on our home wicket. There is a need for our men to realise that batting technique varies from wicket to wicket, and concentration, determination and a straight bat are prerequisites for success. The big drive is not on early in an innings on a slow wicket (especially against slow bowling) and the lofted pull is suicide with men on the deep leg boundary.

The fielding was always good and sometimes brilliant. Certainly chances were missed, some of them easy, one or two crucial, but in the main the spirited fielding gave fine support to our untiring bowlers. It was a pleasure to see spin bowling play such a part in our weekly encounters and in just about every game we bowled more evers at a faster rate than our opposition.

As for the players who formed the team during the year, none was more invaluable than <u>Dave Meagher</u>. After a disappointing start to the season, his batting was brilliant at times and his fielding again was faultless. Great enthusiasm, a fine team spirit are essential parts of Dave's character and he well deserved his Captain Morris trophy for the club's outstanding fielder. His aggregate of 411 with four half centuries at 34.25 must make him a strong contender for second grade next year.

<u>Ian ('Noisy')</u> Smith proved that concentration and good technique are most important requisites and his success in second grade is truly deserved. He played 8 innings in thirds and didn't fail once.

<u>Richard</u> ('Dick' or 'Balls') <u>Campbell</u> replaced Smithy as the skipper's opening partner. His batting was good enough to merit a place in the second grade premiership side. With his wicket keeping brilliant at times, Richard is a certain first grader in the years to come, given that the small lapses in concentration are remedied.

Peter Jourdain played some fine innings and played some shots unworthy of his ability. He must concentrate on eliminating these silly shots and show us his class over a full season. His fielding was of a high standard at all times and 'peaked' in a superb display against Bankstown.

Graeme McBarron who rivals 'Smithy' for the "Quiet Man of the Year" arard had little luck this year. He bowled extremely well in long spells and beat the bat consistently. Apart from two rearguard actions against Petersham and Sydney University, Graeme's batting was well short of his ability. Next year must be a luckier season for him.

Peter Noble said to our raw young(!) captain before the first game of the season "Did you know I can bowl as well?" Two days later, he limped off Birchgrove Oval having bowled 18 overs on that Monday and 11 the previous Saturday and a bag of 10 wickets. That answered his question! A good season's achievement with the ball and in the field, and a good team man made Peter a mainstay in the team. His batting if far better than last season suggests and Peter should do well next year.

John Sands played for us when not at the Caringbah Hotel and bowled extremely well. His line and length indicate a regular seconds spot next year. With the development of a little more variation, he could well bag a big hard in 1978/79.

Steve Price denies that he learned his "run-up" from the Arthur Murray School. A bowled the second date the gradings, bowled well in the presence friendly at learned has in third grade by round six. His line and length disproved week by week and he well deserved his success. He didn't have they chances with the bat in a team with nine or ten alleged battagen.

Glenn (Orca) Cloud Thored a teem team man during the season. With restricted bouling opportunity, he gave of his best. He made a couple of useful contributions with the bat and should concentrate more on this aspect of his play.

John Finlay batted well a couple of occasions and is capable of commanding a regular. His fielding was of a high class and in particular endeared himself to all when he took a couple of useful catches off the skipper's bowling.

Dave Pratt in three matches showed that he has more talent than any of us when he gets his head down.

Tom Grattan-Smith scored a fine 87 against Sutherland, bowled the over of the season against Wests before injuring his knee which curtailed his season.

Greg Robinson who batting in the same class as the skipper's bowling, showed his class as a bowler and cleaned up many second grade sides after he left us.

Bruce Handley, Nigel Perger, Peter Hatkins, Geoff Garland, Roger Robertson, Peter Burnett, Paul Emery, Acoka Wijeratne, Ross LeQuesne and Mick Watt, and Steve Howard all played third grade briefly during the season.

My thanks go to all third grade players for their efforts and support during the year. We tried hard and we can do better by concentrating on eliminating weaknesses and developing a greater will to win. Congratulations go to First and Fifth Grades who made semi-finals, and especially to Terry and his second grade for their premiership win. My thanks also go to Jill and all the other workers in the Club which make it the happy and successful plub it is.

FOURTH LLEVEN 1977-78.

This senson's Fourth XI can rightly claim to be the best performed team that we have fielded to date in this grade. The team won six matches, scored 40 competition points and for about eleven rounds were in the first four or within two points of fourth place. Whilst this is a matter of some pride, the fact that we suffered a depressing run of four consecutive losses late in the competition, which cost us a place in the semi-finals, cast a considerable pall over the season.

The slump mentioned was almost certainly the result of large changes to the team personnel which occurred around the new year. Up until this time our pace attack was led by Emery, with support from Clark and later Hetherington This was balanced with useful batting from Finlay, Gratten-Smith and later Le-Quesne. Most of these fellows are well known for their fielding ability and team spirit so that losing all of them created great problems. In fact we virtually had to rebuild the team again and where opposition sides seemed to be on the improve we were back at square one trying to reform an effective team unit.

Each of these four losses can be attributed to poor fielding. As our fielding early in the season had helped to make our bowling appear more useful than perhaps it really was, this drop in keenness, concentration and ability in the field was really felt by our bowlers. As a result we always seemed to be on the defensive and lost the ability to dictate the run of play in these matches. As the bowling attack was composed of either young players having their first chances in grade or senior members of the club coming back from 'spells' or just suffering a bad trot, one can only feel sympathy for their effortsover this period, as we all could see our semi position disappearing with each fielding error.

Fortunately we were able to redeem this situation in the last round played, whem we defeated Bankstown who were running a close third. This defeat cost them a place in the semis and the game was fought out like a test match. Sent in on an unprepared, wet pitch we grafted through the first afternoon and into the second day showing great determination to make Bankstown fight for a win. Perhaps the determined batting inspired the field as we proceeded to roll or rather catch the opposition by holding seven chances, five behind the wicket. I emphasise this match as it seemed to me that we had proceeded through a cycle and this was the indication that we had moved out the slump and in fact the 'new fourths' had been formed. Unfortunately that was the last game of the season and the re-birth, too late.

Before proceeding to comment on some individuals, I feel I must report the most tragic incident that I have been involved with in sport. Bob Taylor, aggressive opening bowler and fierce competitor for North Sydney left the field during our match, collapsed and died. Although we were able to provide extert attention through Dr Phil McManis, this was to no avail. All of the Fourths and the Club were deeply upset and extend sympathy to Bob's wife and family, parents and team mates.

Some of the individual performances worth noting would include Alex Taylor's batting, particularly in the early part of the season. Roger Robertson, on those occasions he reached the twenties, batted magnificently and steered us to a couple of victories. Roger also filled in as keeper on occasions and was more than useful in that role. Bill Hetherington was the find of the season with his attacking bowling, brilliant fielding and very useful batting. Coming in at nine, Bill knocked up a very courageous 93 against Sutherland, which would endear him to any captain when he was selected as an opening bowler.

Another new team member was Steve Gonski who settled in as a useful opening but. Steve's lack of technique, particularly outside the off, can be rectified and is offset by his tremendous determination. Archer also earnt his keep as a bowler and as an improving batsman. Murray was originally brought up to the side as a replacement pace bowler but as team changes occurred, was given the responsibility of leading the attack. It took a few matches for him to adjust to the task, but he can claim credit for our win against Bankstown and would probably be the most improved player of the season. Garland had trouble with his bowling action but contributed whole-heartedly and/or vocally on all matters on or off the field

Finally, Steve Howard the vice-captain gave me great support and thoughtful advice throughout the season. Steve nor I wish to remember our individual performances, but I will remember his loyalty and assistance during the more trying times. As usual it is easy to lead a winning team, but as the losses occur support from senior members is very important

Congratulations to Terry Buddin and the majic seconds. As our home and away partners we took particular pleasure in their victory. Also commiserations to the fifths, two final losses in two years is very frustating but may be not as frustrating as the weather holding back firsts from retaining their premiership. My thanks must go to all the team captains who were sympathetic and helpful at the selection meetings. Next season, with a little more team stability it is not unreasonable to expect the Forths to make the semis along with all our other grades.

BOWLING:

Stewart Cummings had limited success but gave at all times a full effort.
Murray Archer a fine bowler and justified promotion to higher grades.

FIELDING:

Two players stand out for their contribution in the field, Firstly Doug Baird always tried and any shortcomings in ability where certainly compensated for by his enthusiasm and determination. Secondly John (iron gloves) Barford had a magnificent season behind the stumps and certainly deserves to play higher grades.

The strength of the 5As was in the batting as the figures show yet consistancy was lacking to produce regular wins. The batting average increased over last year but also the opponents batting average increased showing our shortcommings in dismissing sides.

FIVE 'B' REPORT 1977-78

The story of the FTVF B's in the 1977-78 season reads like a replica of the FIVE A's in 1976-77. Both teams finished the minor round in second place and made it through to the final which they lost, mainly due to a lack of application by their batsmen. Certainly, for one of our fifth grade teams to make the final in two consecutive years is a great achievement, revealing what dopth of talent the club has, but our batsmen haven't yet learnt that in finals it is a case of "heads down". At 3 for 84 chasing a mere 126 the final was ours for the taking, but a disasterous slump in the middle and lower order saw us all out for 107. Basically, that was the tale of the season for the FIVE B's. When playing at anything like full strength the only thing standing between the team and victory was ourselves. The FIVE B's were capable of playing cricket of a far higher standard than is usually seen in fifth grade but mixed this with a few very rediccre performances (being dismissed for scores below 110 on four occasions, not great credentials for grade finalists).

At all times the team was magnificently served by its bowlers - here lay our greatest strength. A glance at the bowling statistics verifies this. Five bowlers took twenty or more wickets in the season and on no less than nine occasions did one of these five bowlers take five or more wickets in an innings. Whenever called on for a big effort, our bowlers never failed us. They bowled well on many unresponsive tracks, were always "hungry" for wickets, never let up after the initial breakthrough, and supported each other manfully. It was a captain's delight to have so many talented bowlers at call and to know that the fall of the next wicket was imminent. Good as the bowlers' figures are, they would have been markedly better had our fieldsmen shown the same application. Although some fine catches were taken, at no time could one he sure that the ball in the air would be caught. This was particularly true in the slips area where a very low percentage of chances was accepted. Greater concentration, better fitness, and more practice are the answers here. It was left to Tony Epstein to show how it should be done. Fielding close to the wicket (point and silly mid-on) Tony mace his crivies eat their words by taking no less than five catches in the final - as many catches as any other fieldsman, except the 'keeper, took in the whole season.

Our batting was the most variable quantity in our game. Thanks to Harold Bundy, Bill Hetherington, and Mick Burden, the middle order batting was generally solid and saved us from early setbacks on many occasions. However, when they iniled we were doomed to a low score. Odr top order batting was never really settled. Ian Anderson performed very well in those games that he played. Pessessing a sound technique and dogged determination Iar is suited to playing well above fifth grade. The other batsmen tried in the top four batting positions performed well on occasions but could not be consistently relied upon to score runs. Development of a more determined, "hat to get out", attitude would see these players greatly improve their game. There is one last fact that should be pointed out about the batting. For the season there were ten individual scores of fifty or better but not one of these was made after Christmas . too much curkey and plum pudding? Admittedly, there were more declarations made in the second half of the season in an attempt to score the maximum number of competition points, but surely

this is not the sole cause. Fitness and attitude are contributing factors and no doubt more work by individuals on these key areas of the game will lead to better and even more enjoyable cricket next season. These factors undoubtedly contributed to our mid-season slump when we scored only six competition points in five rounds (and these points after a more than generous declaration from Nth. District 'A').

In this report so far, I have deliberately tried not to mention individuals, but have rather concentrated on certain groups of players and their contribution to the team's overall performance. However, one or two players must be singled out for special mention. Firstly, congratulations to Bill Hetherington on winning the Ted Davis "Player of the Year" trophy. It would be extremely hard to find a more whole-hearted player than Eili The complete all-rounder (he also came second in the "Fieldsman of the Year" competition) Bill always gives 110% in every facet of the game and is an inspiration to all other players. A nore worthy winner would be hard to find. Secondly, Harold Bundy's contribution to the team could not be over emphasized. Harold's experience and knowledge, particularly of the finer points of the game, were of great value. To come back after such a long lay-off and set a new FIVE E batting aggregate record is an achievement which speaks for itself. Finally, my personal thanks to Geoff Mullins who captained the side until overtaken by a sudden calamity - his marriage. I have learnt a great deal from Geoff playing as his vice-captain over the last season and a half. Geoff's "never say die" attitude and the faith he always placed in his team were contagious. The discipline that Geoff had instilled in the team during his period as captain made my job so much easier. I am sure that most of the credit for the 50s making the Final this season lies with him.

In conclusion, from all the 5B players, congratulations to Terry Buddin and his second grade team on their superb premiership win; to John Rogers and the Firsts, congratulations on your third place and bad luck that rain prevented the best team in Sydney Grade Cricket from retaining their premiership pennant. Thanks also to John Rogers for his interest, encouragement and advice to many grateful players throughout the club and to the selectors for their support throughout the year.

Finally, my sincere thanks to all those who played in the 5B's. I hope that you gained from your cricket there and look forward to seeing you all in higher grades next year. Many thanks for making the season such an enjoyable one for me.

Here's to a 5B vs 5A final in 1979 (surely we can't lose it that way, can we?). Naturally though, the 5B's will win!!

As the members of the University of N.S.W. Gricket Club's N.Z. Tour party sat quietly sipping middles of beer in the bar of Sydney's International airport at 7 c'clock in the morning, little did they know that they were setting a trend that was to prevail for the next nine hectic days...and nights! The day was the 3rd Jan, 1978 and the party was about to leave on the clubs first ever venture overseas, a unique event indeed.
