REPORT OF THE MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

Gentlemen,

The Twenty-Second Annual Report and Financial Statement of the University of New South Wales Cricket Club is presented for your approval.

Before reporting on the activities of the Club during the 1971-72 season, it is with deep regret that the Committee records the recent death of the Reverend Stan Eldred from Epping Cricket Club. Stan was well-known and respected by many Club Members, both on and off the field, and he was a Guest Speaker at our 1969-70 Annual Dinner when he so graciously proposed the "Toast to the Club". Stan will be greatly missed by all who knew him, and we extend our deepest sympathies to his family and friends.

The 1971-72 season was a most difficult one for the Club, in that we were severely affected by an unexpected drop in playing strength right from the beginning of the season. Despite this setback, we managed to retain our two crowns from the previous season, the Municipal and Shires Club Championship and the "A" Shire Premiership. When the Semi-Finals came around we were in the running for a Premiership in all three Divisions of the Competition, but our hopes of such a triumph were dashed by the resounding defeats suffered by our "B" and "C1" Shires teams in their respective matches. It is very easy to suggest reasons for these losses after the event, or to shrug them off as being all in the game of cricket, but perhaps a review of the Club's selection policies might supply the answer. Several Members have suggested that the selection of teams should be on an overall Club basis and not just team by team, and this is something which could be considered in the future.

In an endeavour to provide competition cricket for as many players as possible, the Club fielded three teams in the "C" Division Competition for the first time in 1971-72. The Thirds reached the Semi-Final, but the overall performances of the Fourths and Fifths were a little disappointing. However, the Club can be proud of the way in which these teams played the game which is, after all, more important than the actual result. The experience gained by the younger players in these teams will certainly benefit the Club in the future.

Intervarsity fixtures were played against Newcastle and Western Australia during the season. Our visitors were successful on both occasions, but we were not disgraced. The match against Newcastle was one which could have gone either way. The Club represented the University at the Intervarsity Carnival hosted by Monash in January. The team performed creditably, winning the first game against New England, but Adelaide, the eventual winners of the contest, and a very powerful Melbourne team were too strong in the other two games.

This year our social programme included a match against a team from Alexander Mackie College of Advanced Education led by our "Honorary Coach", Wilf Ewens, and it is hoped that this can become an annual event. Our games against Randwick, Burwood, Wollongong University College and the inimitable "World XI" have become "permanent fixtures", and we look forward to meeting these teams again next season. There is, however, some doubt about the "World XI" returning, since their loss this year will require a major Constitutional change if they are to play again. The inaugural Double-Wicket Competition, which replaced the Single-Wicket event, was a great success, with the winning combination being provided by Dave Wills and Jack Howe.

Mr Brian Booth proposed the "Toast to Cricket" at our Annual Dinner, held on 1st June, which was attended by fifty-two people. Mr Ted Wykes, one of a large contingent of umpires present, replied to this Toast. Eric Myatt, from Wentworthville-Blacktown, proposed the "Toast to the Club", to which Vice-President, Professor Harold Oliver, replied on behalf of the Club. Phil Schofield was this year's winner of the trophy for the best allrounder, presented by our Patron, Mr E.H. Davis. The Captain John Morris Fielding Trophy was awarded to Jock Martel, and Peter Larkin was judged the Club's Actor for 1971-72. He was presented with the Barr-Turn Trophy by its previous holder, Rodger Robertson. Mr Warren Saunders, representing the New South Wales Cricket Association, presented Premiership Trophies and Caps. A vote of thanks to our guests was proposed by Geoff Garland. The Dinner has always been the highlight of the social season, and this year was no exception.

Looking at the financial side, the Club is in a strong position. After the setback suffered last season, when we hosted the Intervarsity Carnival, we have recovered sufficiently to place \$200 back into the Sports Association Trust Account and it is hoped that further deposits can be

made next season. The pleasing financial situation is due, in no small way, to the endeavours of our Honorary Treasurer, Hugh Hopkins. We would also like to record our gratitude to the New South Wales Cricket Association for the grant received by the Club at the end of the season.

Attendances at Committee Meetings were generally good throughout the season, but unfortunately the support received by the Executive in the running of the Club left a lot to be desired. Too many tasks were left for someone else to do, and the late apologies received for Committee Meetings were far too many. Members who wish to serve on the Committee must be prepared to share the work, even if this requires a little bit of personal sacrifice.

Once again we extend our sincere thanks to Vice-President, Wilf Ewens, for his assistance at practices throughout the season. In particular, we are grateful to him for arranging for the use of indoor practice facilities at Alexander Mackie College when wet weather hampered our Semi-Final and Final preparations. To all those others who supported the Club during the season we say thankyou.

Having begun this report on a sad note, we must also conclude in similar vein. Our Patron, Mr Ted Davis, is retiring after many years of service to the University, and has advised that he will now be unable to accept the Patronage of the Club. His support of the Club will not cease, however, as he has indicated his desire to perpetuate his Trophy for the leading allrounder in the Club each season. In accordance with his wishes, this award will be known as the "Ted Davis Trophy". We are most grateful to Mr Davis for his generosity in perpetuating this award, and thank him for all he has done for the Club in his time as Patron. We wish him a long, healthy and happy retirement.

FIRST ELEVEN REPORT

Well, we won the Competition, but anyone who backed us throughout the season would have lost his shirt long before the Final. An initial loss to Lindfield was followed by five easy wins (3 outright). Decimated by unavailability against Burwood, however, momentum was lost and only one more game was won before the Semi-Finals into which we scrambled in third position on averages. Without Greig Robinson, the spearhead of our attack, and following some anaemic batting performances, prospects looked dim. A record of the Semi and Final follows, but suffice to say that every member of the team made a valuable contribution - it was a real team effort. In fact, when we experienced hard times after Christmas with the batting, the team effort in the field was exceptional with the games against Lane Cove, Bexley and Wentworthville being outstanding. No Captain could ask for more support from a team.

Opener Alec Dietsch, with 514 runs, was our leading rungetter. His determined 88 against Burwood and classic 92 in the Semi were both outstanding exhibitions of a different kind. In fact, throughout the season Alec batted with more maturity and responsibility than I have seen from him. Heaven help the bowlers if he overcomes a desire to pull half-volleys and yorkers when he is well set.

Vice-Captain Rodger Robertson, pressed into service as the other opener, had a successful season with 402 runs, highlighted by 90 before lunch against Epping. An outstanding field anywhere, Rodger snared 14 catches. Rodger's great 'eye' and free stroking style would certainly have gained him a greater personal tally at No. 5 and the team is indebted to him for his selflessness in offering to open.

Phil Heaney commenced the season at No. 3, scored his initial Club century against Roseville, got married, took Greig Robinson's place as opening bowler, saved the side several times, especially with his 76 n.o. in the Semi, and finally hit the winning run in the Final - not a bad season at all. He also won the batting average. Phil has the shots and temperament; I feel he has only to tighten up his defence to rank with any batsman to have played with the Club.

Anyone with game winning scores of 66 n.o. vs Auburn and 77 n.o. vs Pennant Hills and with 461 runs at 36 as well as 17 catches - the result of some wonderful and gut; y close (2 yards) to the wicket acrobatics - would probably be very satisfied with his perfermance. Jock Martel might just be a little disappointed. His batting promised so much and it was a pity to see him fall so frequently, a victim of his own reckless enthusiasm. Jock was tremendously keen for the team to do well, but if he is to realise his full potential he must learn to build an innings and make the bowler work hard for his wicket.

Joining the team in the fourth round, Club newcomer Carol Samarasekera quickly made his presence felt with elegant drives and wristy cuts. Although he was dismissed only once under double figures, Carol was indiscreet on too many occasions, losing his wicket when apparently well set. With greater concentration Carol should have a big season next year.

Following a fine fighting 58 on a wet wicket in the first round, Graeme Cole's batting fell away. His batting on wet wickets with its necessary back-foot play was at least equal to any other member of the team, but, without trying to analyse Graeme's problems, it is interesting to note that in 9 completed innings on firm wickets he was bowled on 7 occasions. It was, however, as a bowler and slip fieldsman that Graeme made his largest contribution to the team's success. Following fine early season spinning performances against Lindfield and Auburn, Graeme's long accurate spell in the Final at a crucial period heralded his arrival as a mature bowler. Leg spin bowling to Graeme has had its frustrations but I hope that with the confidence he has gained this year his bowling will really 'kick on'.

Our other genuine all-rounder was Barry Cox, who also had a rather disappointing season with the bat. Who in the team will ever forget, though, his magnificent 57 in the Semi? Every shot was hit with authority as he pounded drive and thrashed pull and hook to lay to rest, hopefully forever, the Wenty bogy. Also an excellent field anywhere, Barry's medium pace bowling was an excellent complement to the rest of the attack. His figures speak for themselves and it was a pity more opportunities could not be found for him.

Greig Robinson and George Preston formed our rather enigmatic opening attack. Greig met with well-merited success early in the season, cooled off, then really turned it on at Lane Cove with 20 overs of sustained pace bowling. His intelligent bowling was sorely missed after his departure for the outback. George, by comparison, met with little personal success early as he seemed unable to harness his swing. Missing several games in mid-season, George returned for the Semi and Final with a bang, taking 16 wickets in the two games. Reacting to the added responsibility, he swung and cut the ball while still keeping a good line to such an extent that no batsman played him with confidence.

Hugh Hopkins, in his first season as a keeper full-time did a most commendable job. His keeping to the quicker bowlers left little to be desired and while he was, on occasions, overeager with the slower bowlers I do feel he is a better keeper now with this experience behind him. It was a pity that Hughie appeared the scapegoat in the shake-up at the end of the llth round following some shocking team batting performances and personally I am sorry that this had to happen.

Starting the season late, David Wills never really found his true batting form but when taking over the keeping at the end of the season did a creditable job. Alex Taylor, brought back to the team for the Final, played probably his most valuable innings for the Club and that is saying something, while the inimitable "Duck" justified his late season promotion with solid performances at No. 3. To all the other members who lent assistance throughout the season, the team is most grateful and offers their thanks.

In conclusion I would like to thank the team for their support and assistance throughout the season especially the senior pros, Rodger and Alec, who frequently had to cope with a nervous leader, Hugh who did so much to "water" the team, and finally the two Mrs Robertsons and Mrs Garland for the consistently delightful afternoon teas.

The Semi-Final.

Sent in, everybody got a start until we reached 7-127, when Cox (57) joined Heaney (76 n.o.) and together they took advantage of the early grind to flay the Wenty attack for 118 runs in 85 minutes. Preston (21) blazed briefly but later struck three more important blows to send Wenty to stumps at 3-35. Next day Heaney and Preston struck again and with Garland taking wickets with successive balls Wenty were history at 7-83, but they scrambled to 143. Dietsch (92) completely dominated the second innings as he demolished the Wenty bowling and fieldsmen (literally), and the game eventually fizzled out as Wenty failed in their attempt to score the 369 runs set them in 100 minutes.

The Final.

On a soft though dead wicket, Heaney and Cox took advantage of early Lindfield nerves - 4-32 after 80 minutes. In trouble at lunch (6-77), Lindfield hit out and aided by some atrocious fielding totalled 160. Spinners Garland (3-32) and Cole (2-40) were the most successful, the latter suffering most from the dropsy. Taylor (44) dropped anchor and with Whalan (17) and Samarasekera (30) guided University to 5-126 at stumps. Wills and Garland added a circumspect 23 and at one stage we were 6-157 and everyone knew the game was won. At 9-158 no-one was quite so sure. Heaney, however, had saved a very special on-drive. Determined to chase runs quickly, Lindfield tried to force the pace before they became set. Relishing the situation, Preston was absolutely devastating and at lunch the score was 6-14 (Preston 5-3). Lindfield battled on in a lost cause to score 59 and, with a welcome absence of trauma, Dietsch and Taylor made short work of the necessary 51 runs - a most pleasing result.

SECOND ELEVEN REPORT

In a most remarkable 1971-72 season, the Second XI produced many outstanding efforts resulting mainly in convincing wins. For the majority of games the superiority of the team was never in doubt. However, all chances of regaining the Premiership were lost in the last two games, particularly the Semi-Final when the occasion proved to be a bit too much out of the ordinary for our batsmen. On the other hand, the mere fact of gaining points in every game bar one was instrumental in the Club's retention of the Club Championship.

The team's batting performances reached the satisfying stage where a score of 200 was thought a foregone conclusion. Phil Smith started the season in devastating fashion with two great centuries in the first five games. Early in the season he was well supported by Peter Whalan who settled into the number 3 position quite readily. New opener, Owen Henry, coming into the side for the third game, soon showed he would be full of runs. This was quickly realised when he scored a beautiful century against Burwood. Alex Taylor came good after a tentative start and was back to his previous season form in the latter half of fixtures. Peter Wichkam produced valuable runs towards the end of the season to help the side out of occasional trouble. The side was often aided by others passing through, notably Dave Wills and Carol Samarasekera adding a touch of class to the batting line-up. Zoran Pirjevec and Peter Street also provided valuable assistance on odd occasions while Jim Dormon and Alan Thomas provided staunch support for the more aggressive batsmen of the team.

The batting generally was the so-called strong point of the team with the 200 mark being reached on 8 cccasions. During the full season the team was totally dismissed in only 4 innings, two of these in the only outright loss of the season. This loss was the only real sore point of the season and all one can say is that it was unfortunate to occur in the Semi-Final. The team, after going to a first innings lead, was dismissed for the amazing total of 39 runs in the second innings, undoubtedly the most disastrous effort for many years.

In the bowling department, 106 of the 150 opposition wickets to fall went at the hands of five bowlers. However, these five were never destined to play in the same team and at times the bowling tended to lack the required penetration to dismiss teams quickly. Peter Wickham and Bob Turner provided a very capable spin attack which was not mastered at any time during the season. Ian Webb, Rick Edwards and Rob Howard constituted a reliable new ball attack which at times demoralised opposing teams. It is very hard to gauge the performance of other bowlers as so many were in the team for only two or three games. However, when called on, all gave their best which was more than adequate.

The fielding was a definite "hot and cold" facet of the team's play. Phil Smith and Owen Henry were outstanding on their day, while all others occasionally showed unaccustomed brilliance. Peter Whalan, who kept for most of the season, could be deemed the most unluckiest wicket-keeper as so many apparent dismissals were not allowed.

During the season some 33 players participated in 13 games. Considering only two games were lost, one realises how the new and old members combined into a reliable and successful combination. In my time as Captain of the team, I was indeed grateful for the way in which everyone applied themselves to the task. Bob Turner, as Vice, was invaluable with his assistance and experience, as was Alex Taylor.

Well, the Club Championship is ours for the 7th time in the past E years. What about the "B" Shire Premiership? I would think that to achieve this goal the selection of the top teams should be finalised by the time the semi-finals are at hand. No, or very few, changes should have to be made between teams. Once teams have reached a stability in selection every effort should be made to keep them this way. This gives all teams time to develop some teamwork and purpose of individuals. The time will come when the "B" team is successful and I think the team in the 1971-72 season has laid the foundation for future successes.

My congratulations go to the First Eleven for their well earned success in the "A" Shire Premiership and I hope the Club continues with the same success and spirit under which I was fortunate to play.

The Semi-Final.

The Semi-Final against Wentworthville was a very disappointing game. University lost the toss and were sent in to bat and, not being sure of how the wicket might behave, we were a little apprehensive of what was to come. We started slowly but were soon in our stride, losing our first wicket at 43; by lunch the score had reached 1-96 (Owen Henry 55), having lost forty minutes through rain. Our sights were set on a big score, but this was not to be, the next two wickets falling at 100. This was to be the end of our batting strength, the last eight batsmen adding only 73 runs; still we had the runs on the board.

The opposition made a careful start to their innings but were soon in trouble. We were soon on top (4-15). Our bowling, being very tight, was to be the strength of the team. At stumps on the first day, Wentworthville's score was 8-114.

On the second day we were to dismiss the opposition for an additional 10 runs - the time 10.15 a.m. We were now in the box seat with a lead of 49, thinking that 150 additional runs would see us safe. Then disaster struck - our first three batsmen were out for 15...... A procession of batsmen then started; hardly had a player padded up than he was needed at the crease - the walk to the wicket, a short stay, and a long way back to the pavilion. At 12.10 p.m. it was all over - the last man was dismissed for a total of 39. This left the opposition only 90 runs to score for outright victory. (It took 55 minutes). The howlers again, aided by some good fielding, did a fine job in taking 5 wickets before we were overhauled. Another 60 runs would, I am sure, have given us victory.

In concluding this report, I would like to request that future selection committees give more thought to balance in teams playing the Semi-Finals. This year the First XI had nine recognised batsmen (two of whom were promoted from the Second XI), and seven capable bowlers, plus two wicket-keepers. The First XI wicket-keeper for eleven games was dropped to the Second XI for the Semi-Final (?). If more consideration was given to selection of all teams, perhaps it would be possible for the Club to qualify in all three grades in future years.

Fortunately, we were able to gain enough points from the game to help secure the Club Championship.

FOURTH ELEVEN REPORT

There were three distinct parts to the 1971-72 season as far as the Fourths were concerned. There was the gradual building in the first four rounds of what would have been a most effective unit, followed by the midseason slump when the composition of the team for each game was anybody's guess, with the last four games producing a team which, with a little luck, would have provided a close contest for most of the sides in the competition. The record claimed by Tom Downes in his report last season fell to this year's team - no fewer than 46 different players turned out for the Fourths, and not one player managed to stay in the side for the 13 games. Even the Captain was called up for duty in the Thirds for one match.

Four other records were set by the side during the season. A record low of 33 runs in our first innings against the strong Macquarie University side heralded the slump referred to previously. In his only appearance with the side, Bill Read took 8 wickets in an innings against Lane Cove to equal the best bowling performance for the Fourth XI in the team's seven years of competitive cricket. David Stockley gained a well-deserved record with a bowling average of 9.1 runs per wicket. Had he been allowed to stay in the team for the season I feel sure that he would have exceeded the record aggregate of 38 wickets as well. As it was, he took 28 wickets in 8 games, capturing his 100th wicket for the Club in the last match of the season. It was unfortunate that he was unable to display his talents to their fullest extent when he gained promotion to the Thirds. Not to be left out, the Captain, by judicious field-placing, managed to bag for himself a record number of catches for the season. It should be noted that this is about all the Captain did, as he failed miserably with the bat and experienced considerable difficulty in bowling more than three or four overs at a time when he was allowed to bowl by the rest of the team.

At no stage of the season did the team have a regular opening attack. Alan Goodwin shouldered the responsibility well when he joined the team half-way through the season, but it is perhaps best not to reveal the identity of his partner, who aided and abetted him only to a small extent.

Geoff Borny picked up 12 wickets in the last five matches, and was a most reliable first-change bowler. "Veteran" Stan Livingstone, after a trip overseas, showed that he is still a force to contend with by picking up 9 wickets in the last three games. Had these two been able to play the full season along with Alan Goodwin and Dave Stockley, the bowling attack would have been capable of surprising most opposition teams.

Apart from John Barford, the batting was suspect for virtually the whole season. John's efforts would have been even more valuable to the team and the Club had he been allowed to stay in the one side. He found himself moving freely between the three "C" Shires teams, and this must have had its effect on his performances. As a wicket-keeper John's keenness and enthusiasm could not be beaten, although at times he found himself using the pads instead of the gloves. Here again, a lack of continuity as a keeper had its effect. Ron McInnes, the other keeper, started the season well, and two good innings saw him promoted to the Thirds. However, his form fell away, and he struggled hard with the bat without success for the rest of the season. Towards the end of the season Jack Howe, Geoff Borny, Stan Livingstone and Dick Burgess were the main hopes with the bat, and the team passed the 200 mark for the first time in the last game against the Fifths. Contributions by Harold Oliver are gratefully acknowledged and it is my hope that he can be talked into playing a full season with us in 1972-73.

Mention should also be made of the remarkable improvement in the field shown by John Sindel. John showed us all that being fit is the first requirement in this department. Numerous others gave support with bat and ball at odd times during the year, and the team is grateful for their assistance.

To Dave Stockley, my Vice-Captain for most of the season, and to Geoff Borny, who stood in when Dave was in the Thirds - thankyou for your words of wisdom and encouragement. If the team which finished the season with so much promise could be kept together for the coming season it would certainly be a pleasure to be in that side.

FIFTH ELEVEN REPORT

This year the shaggy Fifths entered the "C" Shires Competition for the first time and during the season seemed long on everything except scores. Long delays in starting, long handles, and long hair were the glorious order of the day. The team suffered from two changes of captaincy during the season, the first from Fraser Airsworth, under whose experienced hands the only victory was obtained, to John Barford (briefly), and from him to Boyd Fowler. Performances during the Christmas break were depressed by a lack of players, and often those picked failed to show. Stalwarts of the team were Fraser Ainsworth, Boyd Fowler, Alan Goodwin, Peter Nicholls, John Prouzos, John Sindel and Noel Skippem, with special appearances upon urgent request by members of colleges when numbers were down. The cricket played often showed glimpses of "C" Shire standard and hopes for improved results next season are good. However, more players are needed, with more practice and experience.

Following is a brief account of the saga.

In the first match (apart from trials against lower grade teams such as the Thirds), U.N.S.W. played Burwood. Only Fowler (15) provided resistance to a strong Burwood attack in the first innings. Burwood scored 3-152(dec.) and then confidently began bowling against seemingly brittle batting with 4 hours in hand. However, defiant batting by Skippen (22), Ainsworth (15), Pidgeon (15) and Butterworth especially (34) saw the day end with U.N.S.W. 9 down for 122. This was our finest day.

Against Lane Cove a week later Menton scored 49 well-compiled runs and Skippen notched 26. Coady was already showing signs of long handled promise. Lane Cove blasted their way to 6 for 233 and U.N.S.W. replied with 124, which obviously was not good enough. Menton again came good with 67 runs.

Canterbury as usual played it tough. Goodwin and Kesby batted well to score 32 and 22, respectively. The team ended up with 141 in the first innings. Led by that inimitable guy Barry, Canterbury replied with 195. Brian Clarke bowled consistently well to take 5 for 51. Kesby picked up a swashbuckling 41 in the second innings and

and Skippem as opener got 29. The youthful Canterbury team them knocked up the necessary 57 to win, but only after great bowling by Clarke (3-25) and Midshipman Tom Steward (4-37) had given them some anxious moments.

The team's big win of the season was in the next match against Epping in which Kesby again starred with 28 runs and 6 wickets for 49. Hurst played some fine strokes in his 52 as U.N.S.W. scored 114 in the first innings. Epping replied with 66. U.N.S.W. then dramatically collapsed for 24 (!), but scraped home with a victory when Epping could manage no more than 63 in their second innings. Kesby bettered his first innings performance by taking 7 for 19.

Since most of the following matches resulted in lucky autright victories for the opposition, it is probably only worth recording notable U.N.S.W. performances. They were as follows:

Alam Goodwin's 3 for 24 against Auburn-Lidcombe;
Tony Bailey's 23 against Canterbury;
Geoff Borny's 4 for 19 in the same match;
Peter Nicholls' 21 against Epping;
Fitzgerald's 0 for 65 against WentworthvilleBlacktown;
Fowler's 28 and Hure's 52 in the same match;
Schofield's 3 for 8 against Canterbury;
Fitzgerald's 3 runs in the same match.

The season had an exciting finish as the Fifths were drawn to play the Fourths. They scraped up 216 runs for 8 wiskets while the Fifths posted 104 and were 6-76 with 4 balls bowled in the last over. A wicket fell on the fifth ball, leaving 3 wickets to be captured in 3 balls. Excitement around the ground was high, but after the sixth ball the Fifths began to pack the kit. Tension on the field was still high, the Fourths not realising that their hopes of an outright were being stored with the gear until next season.

In conclusion, may we wish all grades good luck for the coming season.

INTERVARSITY CARNIVAL

Monash University were this year's hosts for the Carnival, and as we flew out of Sydney after more than a week of rain another washout seemed a distinct possibility. However, we were very pleasantly surprised. The weather throughout the Carnival was ideal.

Having developed a taste for Melbourne ale during the flight down, we were soon on the job on Sunday night, although it was a fairly quiet evening as evidenced by the loo percent turnout for breakfast the following day.

We were drawn to play New England in the first match. New England won the toss and batted, and quick breakthroughs by Greig Robinson and Rob Howard had them 3-25. However, a recovery was staged with a magnificent partnership between O'Neill (87) and Onus (59), who took the score to 153. We captured one more wicket before the end of the 40 overs, and were left with a target of 190. Robinson and Howard each took two wickets.

Seven runs were needed in the last two overs. Five came in the first of these. The determined "Duck" faced the last over and despite constant reminders from the rest of the team he did not seem to realise that victory was so close. However, he was just waiting for the right ball - number 8. This he despatched backward of point for three to bring us victory and earn himself a well-deserved 50 not out.

The barbecue at Monash that night was an ideal forum for the celebrations which followed our win. The beer flowed freely, and attempts were made to woo the nurses present, many of whom also appeared to flow quite freely. Attendance at breakfast the next morning was again good, but the strain was beginning to show on some faces.

We batted first in the second game against Adelaide, but we were never really in it. The side collapsed to be 6-44, with "Animal" Wright (20) the only batsman to get a start. It was left to the skipper (24), with his far-reaching forward thrust, to give the innings an air of respectability. He was ably assisted by Bill Read before he successfully ran him out with 100 on the board. We reached 108 off 37 overs. Adelaide had no trouble in passing our score, losing only two wickets in doing so. Bullock, the opener, contributed 55 not out.

Tuesday night was a "free" night. The team discovered an underground bar at "The George" and settled in for the night. A rousing rendition of the National Anthem at closing time had the patrons calling for more, but it was time to catch the floor-show upstairs. Les and her friends provided most of the entertainment at the table next to ours, while the waitresses kept us satisfied with a never-ending supply of jugs. The breakfast ranks thinned a little the next day.

In the final match against the strong Melbourne side we were well and truly beaten. Skipper Robinson conveniently had a recurrence of a leg injury and handed the responsibility to Jock Martel. The bowlers tried hard, but all the batsmen got going and Melbourne reached 5-304 in the 40 overs. The team took up the challenge, but were soon in trouble at 2-24. Ian Bray contributed a handy 21, but our hopes depended on the Animal and Strapper. They went about the task in a most enterprising manner, until Jock (33) was caught and bowled by Higgs with the score at 104. Alan Wright (36) soon followed, and apart from a last-ditch effort by John Barford and Bill Read who had some good batting practice, Paddy Grattan-Smith with 31 was the only other ray of hope. We were all out in the 40th over for 186.

Another barbecue at Monash and more Melbourne beer were an ideal way to relax in preparation for the gruelling day ahead - watching the Final. Experience was beginning to show by now, and breakfast on Thursday morning was attended by only half the team. It was not altogether clear which half this was.

While the Final between Adelaide and Western Australia was in progress, the Manager led an eight man team in an eight over challenge match against Tasmania. We proved our superiority and staying power with an effortless win, although the Manager's contributions to this victory were considered negligible despite the fact that he took two wickets bowling right arm under the wicket. In the Final,

Western Australia reached 162 all out in the last over, and Adelaide, sensing victory, methodically gained the required runs with the loss of 5 wickets and three overs to spare.

The Carnival was a tremendous success, and our thanks go to our hosts, Monash, for the wonderful hospitality they accorded us. Congratulations to Adelaide on their victory.


