

COACHING REPORT

After our hard work of last season I can only report that this season was disappointing. Having finished in the Top 6 of the Club Championship and four grades in the semi finals last season, this season's expectations fell well short of the mark with only 5th grade making the semi finals. 1st Grade showed some improvement this season under David Carson's leadership. Some of our younger players in 1st Grade are gaining valuable experience and are starting to work the game out a little better. Hopefully this will flow through to a further rise up the ladder next season.

Again our pre season started back in July with Dave Heysen looking after the players' fitness. This was followed by our net sessions at the Village Green. Good attendances at training were promising with upwards of 70 players at any one training session. We finished up our pre season with trial games against Sydney Uni.

To all the people who helped out during the season to run training I would like to thank you. With special mention to Peter Richardson who did an outstanding job running the book. Richo did anything asked of him and more, including fielding drills, general advice, and keeping batsmen and bowlers happy at training (which isn't an easy task). Jeff Hargraves as our cricket admin man who also helped out at training when possible. Jeff also looked after our wet weather bookings at the SCG and alerted players to changes in practise schedules. Luke Sutton, who was our English import, was back with us after a few years absence. Luke set the standard at training by always being there and working hard at improving his skills and the skills of people around him.

I would also like to thank Ray Galway and staff for their excellent practise wickets at the VG. At times wet weather made it hard to have turf wickets this season but you knew Ray would generally have wickets ready if possible.

FIRST GRADE REPORT

Season 2001/2 was in golfing terms about a par for the 1st grade bees, as the perrenial midfielders lived up to their game yet again. However, positive gains were made to the squad through some new additions to the clubs ranks.

Quite a few of the clubs playing resources throughout the year were utilised in first grade as the club succumbed to individuals off field commitments and various ill timed injuries. As performances displayed, contribution of these players positively indicates the playing depth we have in the club.

Bearing current player strength, club management and facilities in mind, I think the UNSW first XI, and club, can look optimistically towards the coming season. Consequently, it is logical to align our team and club goals towards being a consistently dominant force in the Sydney grade competition.

However, it is readily acknowledged that these goals are only attainable through improvement both as a team and as individuals. Drivers for this incremental improvement process and can be derived through analysing past performances and identifying successful training and playing approaches. This report aims to identify some of the successful approaches adopted by the team, as well as highlighting particularly successful individual approaches.

Generally speaking the team process employed before christmas was excellent. After numerous discussions with the wizened Pete Richardson and others, it was collectively decided that focus was to be given to the important but basic processes required to play well. Building partnerships, operating with specific plans and playing as a team were all theme that were effectively utilised and built upon.

There were numerous instances of pairs successfully bowling in partnership last year, but as time and paper are at a premium, I will choose one example, .the Penrith game. Dan and Wazza combined to take the whole 10 Penrith wickets between them. Dan bowled brilliantly on this day, capturing a personal bag of 8. He was in full control of direction and movement of the ball, in the air and off the seam. Wazza realised this, and provided the perfect foil for Dans spell on this day by consistently building pressure up the other end. Wazza made runs such a premium that he finished the day with figures of 2 for 8 off 16 miserly overs.

Clearly value can be gained from the process of understanding what the individuals bowling partner is trying to achieve. From this understanding, a collective approach to the removal of the batmen can be devised. On this day the process was employed. It worked quite well. Look at the results.

Consistent partnership building with the bat was undertaken by the top order engineroom of Richo and Sutts. Simple plans involving patience, thoughtful shot selection and excellent running between the wickets were utilised effectively. With this stability at the top, firm foundations were laid for our innings together with formation of a readily identifiable structure for our days batting. Particular attention should also be paid to Watto, who featured heavily in an impressive amount of significant partnerships, often which led to victories.

Teamwork was another concept that was developed sporadically throughout the season. One of those such days was against Parramatta, where the very essence of teamwork was encapsulated. As a cohesive unit we scrapped, fought and tussled our way to a win. Each crucial stage in the game someone elevated the standard, which lifted the group collectively and generated a positive outcome.

Being part of games such as that really make you realise and appreciate why one spends so much time whiling away the hours during the summer months, playing a game that few understand or appreciate.

Strength of player depth can be revealed by looking at the number of players who made successful debuts in the top grade. An obvious candidate is Gavin Mcdonald. Gavo played exceptionally in his one first grade game, top scoring in our second innings in what were very testing conditions to say the least. Shot selection and an unflappable temperament are hallmarks of Gavs game, which will get ample opportunity to be utilised next season.

Other notable rookies include Eric Zehner. Hagar can potentially add another dimension to the first team line up. His ever improving middle to late order batting and excellent fielding combine well with his left arm benders. His bowling came together nicely in our win against Manly, and displayed him taking utmost time and care to bowl to his field. Patience and strategy paid off for Hagar as he captured two vital wickets at a good economy rate, even managing to grab a first class scalp! (phelpsy).

KD brought a new and effective method to the club from his engineering background. The process of measure, control, improve was adopted by KD at training, religiously noting the accuracy and effectiveness frequencies of his different deliveries. This process proved very effective in emphasising the importance of accuracy and controlled variation when bowling. Dividends payed off handsomely for KD with a season bag of 30 odd wickets, at an excellent economy rate. Further value was added by KD in the player development area. KD is always willing to share constructive thoughts, opinions and advice with fellow club members in direct and honest manner.

Mick Watson stormed into the side, announcing himself on the first grade stage with a string of impressive knocks, including an aggressive ton againsts Wests. Self belief, aggression, focus on batting partnerships and an emphasis on teamwork all enabled Gerard to perform outstandingly and figure significantly in a lot of the games we won.

Richo provided the club with a reliable basis for which competitive totals could be amassed. Patience and the building of partnerships were effective processes which allowed him to relax and bat for long periods. Dividends came in the form of nigh on 500 before christmas, along with two important centuries. However, he was sadly let down after christmas by his aversion for calcium, and suffered another broken arm to curtail what could have been an outstanding year with the bat.

Luke Suttons consistency with the bat brought structure to the teams innings, allowing partnerships to develop and flourish. His professional approach to batting, beers, training and cricket in general added value to the side as the season progressed.

Lankys contribution to the side when on the paddock was considerable. Increased accuracy and patience with the ball proved to be an effective combination with his fast outswing and seam. All batsmen found lanky a difficult customer to handle, as is evidenced by his impressive stats. This season past proved he is in the top bracket of bowlers in grade and indicates to me that he should be aiming for higher honours.

One of the reasons the first grade squad had a smooth preparation and transition into the first game was because of our resident fitness instructor and new ball bowler Heyso. His commitment and organisational skills provided the squad with ample pre season preparation. Daves outswingers had good success in providing breakthroughs in the opposition top order and an ability to effectively reverse the ball was definitely an asset for a captain. His input as a senior player was both valued and appreciated by myself and the rest of the squad.

Shaker was invariably the teams honest seamer. Always able to bowl accurately to his field and adhere to a bowling plan, he was a captains dream. Unerring accuracy combined with movement off the seam paid dividends in the final game of season, as a deserved five wicket haul was captured.

It was a pleasure to witness the continued development of Dan Christian into a dominant force on the grade scene. Self belief and commitment towards training and playing with high standards quickly transferred potential into effective performance. Highlights of Dans year included a haul of eight wickets and 30 vital runs against Penrith, 4 wickets against Parramatta, and a century against frontrunners Mosman. Each of these performances were quality in there own right. Dan combined mature cricketing qualities of poise and clearheadedness with an ability to raise his level of performance whenever a crucial moment in the game arrived.

Rohans game adds another dimension to the side due to his aggressive approach with the bat and variety of shots to select from. In the field Rohan is definetely an asset, possessing a great set of hands and intuition in the infield. Roggie has yet to announce himself permanently on the first grade stage. However, when it happens I would like to be there...It will be a hell of a watch.

Ben Day was another addition to the hive, easily making the transition to the Bees from rival club Easts. Benny added value to the side through his calming influence and commitment to the team and club cause. It is always rewarding to play with blokes who are genuinely interested in team and club performance above individual success and as such I look forward to him dominating the scoring next season.

Nealo made a return to the club after a year in exile with the Easts club. He fitted straight back in and put on high quality displays behind the stumps, as was evidenced by him setting a record for the club for most dismissals in a season. His stats displayed a significant amount of dismissals being from stumpings, which indicates his ability with the gloves.

Jaideep Bedi, fresh from the fields of Melbourne Uni cricket club, was yet another addition of fresh blood into the hive. Bishs ability to bowl both well flighted offies and leggies provided a handy option with the ball. His competitive nature and ability on the field proved crucial and allowed us to just squeeze over the line in some close games. The boys appreciated his penchant for lateness, as the penalty was a case of amber nectar. Nice one Bish.

Minimal opportunity for valuable batting time during the initial part of the year impacted heavily on Todd Hoares season. However, several valuable and important contributions were made throughout the course of the season, which enabled the side to achieve positive outcomes. I look forward to seeing Toddy return next year feeling fresh, and ready to score mountains of runs for the bees.

Langers was our final and youngest new recruit, playing the final game of the season after a dominant year with the ball in second grade. Langers bowls, fields and plays with passion for the bees and for the game, which is invigorating to see. He will no doubt be seen more as the next few seasons unfold and his cunning repoirtiore continually refines and develops.

Finally on the playing front, I would like to mention our resident test opening batsmen, Slats. It is difficult to describe what it feels like to have a player of such rare quality in your side, but I am sure it involves the words power, confidence and invincibility somewhere. Put simply it is a priveledge to watch him ply his trade and I look forward to seeing some more of it next year.

Pete Richardson is another member of the team I would like to mention. Pete quite simply gives an enormous amount to both the club and to our side. From organisation, to management and planning of tactics, Pete has acted as a wonderful support and sounding board for myself and the

A close look at the way we were winning makes it less so. In every game we won pre-Christmas, one or two batsmen scored heavily, the rest next to nothing. For several games, it was the same one or two batsmen. Once the well went dry for these guys post-Christmas, and the other couple who had made runs were in 2nd Grade, the lack of depth in our (and the Club's) batting was exposed. So began the slide.

Ironically, the 3rd Grade team had the services of players with vast First Grade experience (Pratt, Johnson, Horley) for most of the season, with cameos from others (Dixon, Hayward, Milliken). However of these, only AJ and myself played close to a full season, and we contributed little post-Christmas.

On the positive side, our bowling attack produced consistently throughout the season. A perusal of the bowling stats shows that of the seven players who bowled 40 overs or more, five averaged under 24, and three of those under 19. Overall, the guys did their job, and did it well.

Some individuals (mainly bowlers) deserve mention. Greg Dennis was the backbone of our attack, bowling more overs (169.4) than anyone else. With 21 wickets at 23.67, he was a deserving winner of the bowling award. Mick Mag (16 wickets at 18.63), despite the burden of Barr-Turn incumbency, bowled (and batted) with the determination, ticker and passion with which I've come to associate him. Ben Lockett (15 wickets at 21.13), joining the team in Round 7, exhibited a fine outswinger on a regular basis. Jon Horley (13 wickets at 16.92) showed glimpses of the top-grade firebrand he once was, and Chris Vonwiller, in only 49 overs before being snaffled by 2's, showed his class and reliability with 9 wickets at 15.67.

As for the batsmen: Andrew Johnson looked every inch the elegant, quality batsmen he is in compiling 474 runs at 36.46. However, he scored practically all of them pre-Christmas. Sohail Mohideen, in his 8 games for 3's, racked up 284 runs at the excellent average of 47.33. Ian Foster showed promise in his 5 innings, averaging 32 in totalling 128 runs.

Finally, a personal indulgence. After 25 years of cricket, the last 17 for UNSWCC, it's time for me to stop. The enjoyment that sustained me over that period has simply evaporated. For the majority of those 17 seasons, playing cricket for the UNSWCC was central to my existence. I couldn't get enough cricket; game days and training meant fun in the sun with a bunch of great blokes; the dressing room after a win was the Promised Land itself; and as for Saturday nights...I couldn't do them justice within the confines of this report; it is perhaps enough to say that those nights, at whatever pub we were calling home, were the essence of why I played. I'm probably proving my obsolescence, but the staid, septuagenarian, cocooned environment of the Randwick Labor Club, or

any place like it, is not for the UNSWCC. Summer Saturday nights spent there are but a tepid imitation of the halcyon days.

[Editor's Note: the views expressed by the 3rd grade skipper are his personal views. Our captains are given the latitude they desire in publishing their season's reports. The UNSWCC is not endorsing his views but would not look to suppress his views in any way]

The UNSWCC certainly gave me more than I gave it. If I had to choose its greatest legacy, it would be the close friendships I forged under its banner. Put simply, my life is enriched because of my time with the Club. To be able to say that of anything - sporting institution or otherwise - is rare. For this and so many other reasons, the UNSWCC is to be cherished.

FOURTH GRADE REPORT

Fourth Grade's season came to a disappointing end when, after going into the last round in third position and with a home final beckoning, we missed out on the finals altogether by .01 of a quotient point – something like 20 runs or one wicket one way or another over the course of the summer.

In such a situation you can always look back at things which could have been different and very simplistically we could say we missed out on the finals due to a poor batting performance under pressure on our final day. However in reality we had at that stage nearly performed something of a minor miracle in getting there after unavailabilities throughout the Club had severely disrupted the guts of our season. The level of this disruption was unprecedented in my twelve years at the Club – borne out by the fact that 33 people played Fourth Grade during the season.

After three rounds, with competition for places keen and with a bowling attack bolstered by Brett Bannerman and Plugger Lockett (both of whom finished in Second Grade), we were clear competition leaders. Then, when the craziness started, we lost five out of our next six games, a couple to moderate teams who finished well below us in the competition. When some measure of stability returned to our side in mid-January, we played some good cricket and won four tough games in a row, three of them against sides who were also in finals contention.

While I do not mean to be park out unavailabilities as the sole reason for Fourths missing out on the finals (no matter who we had in the side, the University Batting Collapse was, as usual, always lurking), the disastrous middle third of our season did highlight a problem that the Club needs to address. I believe we have wandered into an era where too many of our players have a purely recreational attitude to their cricket, which is inappropriate for a Grade club. I imagine this culture would be at home in Sbires cricket and in the current climate its continuation could see us becoming part of that scene. From November to early January it got to the point where we were retaining or even promoting players who were out of form, entirely due to our thin numbers. The rest, our results, was all pretty logical.

I'm sure that many of the things our players did this season to participate in life's rich pageant instead of being available for every game will result or has resulted in them being happier, better balanced people. However, the fact is that for the Club to be successful in Grade we need to give cricket some priority in our lives for seven months of the year. Perhaps in a University environment this is not always easy but we <u>must</u> get over this if we are to succeed. When we do, some of us might play for New South Wales or Australia along the way, albeit with some sacrifice – perhaps coming back early from schoolies, going on winter holidays and skipping the wedding but going to the reception.

Now for the positives. In all of the various combinations Fourths put on the field this year the effort and spirit was excellent and the sense of "team" real. Our new players contributed greatly to this and it was truly enjoyable to be on the field and in the dressing room with them. Amongst this we also discovered some young talent who hopefully will progress to higher levels and to me, this is just as important as winning lower grade premierships. We played good cricket for the majority of the time, behaved better than most sides and always did it while retaining our sense of humour. It was fun.

The major players, in vague batting order were:

David Jebb – a lot of starts and no hundreds.

Tristan Thompson, a player in a constant state of knowing that none of it really matters, came into the side after three rounds and had a good season at the top of the order. His sound technique and

unflappable temperament enabled him to play long innings and his hundred against Mosman on a seaming deck was the type of dig that has been far too rare in recent Uni history. With further development I'm sure he will succeed at higher levels and in the near future he should be an important part of our PGs side.

Tallaesen Fleming shouldn't be sniffing around Fourth Grade at this stage of his career and his batting generally looked a cut above the rest in the five games he played for us. What may determine where he ends up playing is how much time and effort he wants to put into his cricket while it competes with the other areas of his life – I played with two of his brothers and I think this dilemma may well be in the blood!

We were fortunate to get Smokin' Big Dog **Jim Dixon** on board when he came out of semiretirement when things were getting dire on the player availability front. As always, Disco was a selfless team man, a lesson in line, length and movement with his bowling, the cause of great captaincy stress with his ultra-attacking batting and, despite constantly foreboding doom about himself in the slips, the snarer of a couple of brilliant catches. He also provided a steady stream of considered and valuable advice to me as captain and last but definitely not least, cold beer for everybody in the dressing room.

Michael Pigg looked to have all the ingredients to score plenty of runs but never quite got going. His highlight was 52 against ultimate grand finalists Manly, but a holiday not long afterwards may have cost him some momentum. Piggy's contribution to a happy dressing room was quietly significant.

Although new to the Club, **Ryan Butta** quickly proved himself to be a unique individual and was another who made a significant contribution to the excellent spirit in the team. He would have been the player in the side most affected by withdrawals, and received several chats about why he was being dropped, only to be recalled a day or two later. He took all of this with good humour and could always be counted on for a 100% effort in whatever he did. As one of the few genuine all-rounders in the Club, some minor tightening of his free-flowing and natural batting and a bit more consistency in his always-bound-to-be-underrated bowling will see him develop into a very valuable player.

There is no doubting **Olvier Higgins** is highly motivated to move "up the order" with both the gloves and the bat. His batting, not his strong suit when he arrived at the Club two seasons ago, progressed a lot this season and his 42 not out against Sydney Uni when we had collapsed was an innings he couldn't have played a year earlier. He certainly has a sound technique in place and the next step for him will be developing promising twenties into longer innings – hopefully his winter in Evercreech batting at No.3, which will carry with it a bit of pressure from the locals to perform, will further expand his game. His keeping was good for Fourth Grade but probably didn't progress to the degree that his batting did. If he is to achieve his desired promotions in a club chockful of 'keepers he will need to put in a lot of work outside of what the Club routinely provides on a Tuesday and Thursday – so that when he gets in the middle he catches everything he should, all day, every day.

Gary Fuss came into the side in the second half of the season and had an immediate impact on our ability to bowl sides out. A genuine strike bowler, some of his spells wouldn't have been out of place in Second Grade. With the new ball he always put pressure on the openers and sweeping aside the tail bowling fast and straight was a specialty of his. His willing and unselfish attitude made captaincy a lot easier and his addition to the side went a long way towards making us finals contenders (again). Never one to push his own barrow, it emerged that our judgement of his batting may well have been seriously awry when his prolific run scoring feats in Canberra 1st Grade were casually extracted from him during the last game of the season.

After returning from an unsuccessful stint in Thirds in the latter part of the season **Rob Deutsche** made major contributions with both bat and ball at important times in our (near) run to the finals. A knee injury restricted him towards the end of the season but he could always be counted on for maximum effort and importantly, putting pressure on the openers with the new ball. His aggressive attitude at times pushed the boundaries but I believe he mellowed somewhat this season and is close to "getting it right" (although I understand that we still might have a problem when he plays his old club!).

Nick Janzen's legspin showed enormous potential and with all the balls in place it really is just a matter of practice, and the confidence that a lot of bowling will bring him, for him to take hold of the obvious opportunities that exist in the Club. A day in the field wasn't complete without his flipper taking a wicket and a couple of his abominable sledges.

After making a big move from Penrith, **Mark Bennett's** season came to a disappointing end through injury but in the six matches he played he showed that he will be a valuable batting all-rounder when he's back on the field. He was also on track for some sort of catching record before he pulled up lame. I'm sure 2002/2003 will be a big year for him.

Grant Butler fell into a similar category. Despite his opportunities being limited by injury, he still showed us that there will be plenty of action when he gets back on the field fully fit. In a couple of early season cameos his batting looked potentially devastating and given that his bowling is his first string, we can expect big things from him in the future.

Of the others who played Fourths, **Roger Smith** did a fine job with the gloves whenever called upon, **David Bell** played a big part with the bat in three post-Christmas games before becoming unavailable and **Nigel Dornan** looked to be approaching his best form before the ski fields of Japan beckoned.

To finish the playing side on an extremely positive note, **Ian Foster** batted very well in three games while passing through us on his way to higher grades and **James Byrne** showed in only two games that he is a player of rare talent and will play a big role in the Club, especially with the ball but probably also with the bat, in the future. Lastly, thanks to that mad bastard **Darren Sue** for his statistical work. The standard of the data he produced this season wouldn't be out of place in international cricket circles and it was indeed helpful to be able to have so many forms of it explaining why we were crap.





SIXTH GRADE REPORT

The 2001/2002 season saw a number of changes for the club's 6th grade team. The Metropolitan Cup in which the 6th grade team competes further expanded. From two divisions of eight teams the previous season, 2001/2002 saw expansion to three competitions (Metropolitan Cup, Metropolitan Shield, and Metropolitan Plate) comprising 28 teams from both grade and shire clubs. The Metropolitan Cup (the top division) comprised of 10 teams including UNSW and seven other grade clubs. The expansion has been a boost for the competition as the stronger grade clubs were placed in the top division thereby improving the standard and quality of the cricket played.

The new season also marked the appointment of a new captain. Ruch Wickramasena, having captained the team for the previous three seasons, handed over the reigns so as to enjoy a well earned rest. His deputy, Andrew Jones, also took a sabbatical to pursue academic interests overseas. Yours truly kindly accepted the keys to the 6th grade team with a mix of honour and trepidation.

This season saw a large number of new players to the club. With selectors unsure of their abilities, a number of these players found themselves in 6th grade. Indeed, in Round 2, only two players in the 6th grade side (myself and Mustard) had played a previous season with the club. Despite, or perhaps because of, not knowing much about each other, the team quickly developed a great camaraderie and this contributed to some early season wins that kept us near the top of the table.

The early season form of some of the newcomers demonstrated their ability and it became obvious that their calling was in the higher grades. The contributions made by the likes of Michael Pigg, Ryan Butta, David Bell, and Gary Fuss were greatly appreciated before their promotions.

As the season progressed an all too familiar theme began creeping into many of 6th grades games. Although we would excel with the ball, our batting was scratchy and big totals seemed to be just out of our grasp. After successfully chasing 250-odd in Round 2, another 200 plus innings did not eventuate until Round 10. The lack of runs did not necessarily mean a lack of victories. As the season progressed, it became clear that we were a team that liked to chase totals instead of setting them. Successful run chases versus Gordon, Easts (outright), Fairfield-Liverpool and North Sydney in the first half of the season kept us in the all important top 4 going into Christmas. All these victories (except Gordon) were achieved after excellent bowling had restricted the opposition to sub-150 totals.

The New Year saw a boost in our strong bowling attack with Dutch representative Joost Leemhuis, youngster Robbie Dooley and Mark Retter making appearances in 6th grade. With a potent bowling attack we convincingly defeated Sydney University (just missing an outright) and dominated Gordon (in our second encounter for the season) before the weather foiled us on Day 2. A second victory against Easts and a win by forfeit against UTS-Balmain allowed us to finish the season 3rd on the ladder to snare UNSW's first ever semi-final appearance in the Metropolitan Cup.

Through out the season there were some stand-out performances:

BOWLER OF THE YEAR - Peter (Jerry) Maguire: Rookie Pete did not make an appearance on the field until Round 3 but quickly demonstrated his abilities with the new ball. Although he does not bowl with a great deal of pace, he used his considerable height together with clever variation to keep batsmen guessing. A haul of 22 wickets @ 13.23 was his reward. Another highlight of Pete's season was his fielding. His catch at deep mid-wicket at DP South versus Gordon would win any classic catch competition.

BATSMEN OF THE YEAR - Ian (The Big O) Ornelas: In a season where most of our batsmen under-achieved, Ian demonstrated that putting a high price on your wicket will be rewarded. Three

half centuries for the season (with a total of 253 runs at 36.14) ensured that Ian was the backbone of our batting. Ian hopped between 5th and 6th grade all season and despite his success in 6th grade he could not replicate his form in 5's. Let us hope next season he can make a successful step up in grade.

Special mention must also go to Jim Maroulis. Another rookie, Jim was a serious contender for the batting (255 runs @ 23.18, two half centuries) and bowling (24 wickets @ 19.96) awards. Jim's bowling developed considerably over the season while his batting was always a danger to the opposition. If he works hard on his bowling and improves his concentration with the bat then higher grade honours are not beyond him.

In a team that was dominated by the rookies there were a number of other notable performers. Chintaka Mampitiya surprised many batsmen with his pace, line and length while his powerful hitting in the lower order marked him as an all-rounder of the future. Mayur Kulkarni, David Dunne and Victor Bourke had interrupted seasons but they demonstrated their talent with the willow with bigger things expected from them next season. Liam Smith demonstrated some handy glovework behind the stumps while he batted with flair and confidence.

Of the non-rookies, Dave Kachor was invaluable. Floating between 5th and 6th grade all season, Dave always gave 100% with the new ball and made valuable contributions with his underestimated batting. Mark Lucas proved that he is a potent weapon with the ball with some impressive performances however inconsistency plagued him throughout the season. Dave Little made a welcome return to the club and was always solid behind the stumps. The captain appreciated having Dave's experience on the field and was a constant source of ideas and suggestions.

The season was epitomised by our performance in the semi-final versus Sydney University. A strong bowling performance saw us dismiss the opposition for a modest 177. Chasing this very achievable total, our batting was at times beautiful to watch. As happened regularly during the season however, rash stroke-play and lapses in concentration saw our top-order fail to capitalise on strong starts. The exception was opener Ian Ornelas (72) who almost carried his bat and won us the game. The result was a disappointing three run loss. Some backbone in our batting should ensure that next season we can improve on what has been an impressive season for 6th grade.

I would like to thank all players who donned their whites for 6th grade this season. They made it an interesting and thoroughly enjoyable season. Thanks also to Orca and Disco and the other members of the selection committee for their very helpful advice and suggestions. A very special thanks must also go to my wife Tania for her support and patience thoughout the season.

Although this is so – wicketkeepers should NEVER bowl, no matter what they say or how they rate themselves!

There are many thankyous to the people that kept this team within some sort of order and that helped a struggling skipper press on. A big thank you to Jim Butler (manager) that attended every game and gave me great insight to the continual losses. Also Disco and Orca —without these guys we surely would have been lost. A good motivator and someone that speaks his mind (a good thing for PGs!) was Darren Sue, his presence at the last couple of games was fantastic.

In closing, we all grew from this experience and I'm sure that issues will be addressed (factor X!) and that the importance of the PGs team will be recognised.

A.W.GREEN SHIELD REPORT

The 2001/2002 UNSW Green Shield campaign was one that should be considered overall pleasing but also unfulfilling and under achieving with six players coming back for their second season of Green Shield plus a number of new recruits with good potential for next season.

Most players in the squad showed obvious development and improvement in their particular skill areas yet it was our collective and individual lack of mental strength and confidence that restricted us from winning at least three more games (Wests, UTS Balmain and eventual finalists, Manly) on top of the one win (Sydney University) and the tie (Manly) we did eventually achieve.

Having said that, it was enormously pleasing to see *every* player in the squad learn about their own cricket at each session and each game but also to see the guys eagerly looking to learn, both individually and with team-orientated goals.

In particular, the experience and knowledge that captain, 'keeper and top order bat, Alex Braid, looked to develop on top of his undoubted natural ability and work ethic was tremendously satisfying and should auger well for future years.

The season's results and report were:

Round 1 vs Gordon at the Village Green

After losing the toss on a stinking hot day, UNSW started well by grabbing two early Gordon wickets but good batting and inconsistent bowling led Gordon to a solid total of 8/246 off the 60 overs. Andrew Plummer (0/29) bowled extremely with out luck, whilst Luke Irwin (3/32 off 8), David Ross (2/35 off 12) and Peter Levido (2/17 off 6) were the bowling highlights.

In reply, multiple UNSW brain explosions meant that we were 8/52 off 22 overs at one stage. Only late cameos by Patrick Smith (33) and Tim Hood (24*) kick us to an extremely disappointing 100 all out.

Round Two vs Western Suburbs at Pratten Park

Following the disappointing performances against Gordon, UNSW bounced back with a solid start against Wests, restricting them to 8/214 off the 60.

However our relative inexperience and ability to read situations proved costly as we failed to chase down an achievable total despite a superb innings from Alex Braid (85). With only Anthony Brooks (23) offering any support but losing his wicket at a pivotal time, Wests restricted us to 194, still 18 runs behind.

Round Three vs Northern Districts at the Village Green

On a typically faultless VG wicket, we won the toss and set a handy total against one of the better teams in the competition. Led by Anthony Brooks (82) and Tim Hood (44), we were dismissed in the last over for 203 but we again rued crucial dismissals that cost us potentially an extra 40 runs.

What followed next was both a mixture of some superb batting from two ND bats and some abysmal bowling and fielding as NDs chased 2/205 off only 43 overs.

A game that could only be described as a learning experience.

Round Four vs UTS Balmain at the Village Green

In a low scoring game, it was our collective lack of confidence and never-say-die attitude that proved the difference in an otherwise quality performance by the lads.

Despite only scoring a disappointing 130 (all out) against an attack that lacked little after their new ball bowlers, the guys came out and attacked UTS Balmain with refreshing purpose and passion.

Led by a genuinely quick opening spell by Andrew Plummer (0/25 off 12) and Luke Irwin (4/25 off 10), all the guys bowled to a plan and the standard of fielding reflected the efforts of their bowlers.

Yet, after having UTS Balmain 6/60, 7/100, and 8/101, the lads lacked the ability to land the killer blow and Balmain, to their credit, scrapped their way to an otherwise unlikely win.

Round Five vs Sydney University at Syd Uni No.1

A breakthrough win that was well deserved by the UNSW lads.

Bowling first, the UNSW bowlers never allowed Sydney Uni any latitude or width and the fielders backed that up with two quality run-outs to roll our traditional rivals for 122 off 53 overs. In a great team effort, David Ross (3/15 off 12) and Bruce Purcell (1/14 off 12) were the pick of the bowlers.

In reply, the guys chased the relatively small Sydney Uni total intelligently by batting around the anchor-type rolls of Tim Hood (35) and Luke Irwin (27*) for the loss of seven wickets to record the first (and well deserved) win of the 2001/2002 Green Shield season.

Round Six vs Manly-Warringah at Graham Reserve

Bowling first again on a low, slow turning wicket, we began well by picking up a couple of early wickets. After a reasonable partnership by the Manly 'guns', the UNSW guys bowled and fielded well to dismiss Manly for 153 off 54 overs.

After a shocking start (2/1), we seemingly looked in control as Alex Braid (59) and Anthony Brooks (20) cruised to the 100 mark with only four wickets down. However, Manly sensing an unlikely defeat and blow to their prominent egos, nervously raised their game to take a couple of key wickets.

At 7/149, all looked the good as Nick Brady (35*) roared along but our last three were outdone by the Manly attack to end the game a very unsatisfying tie against the eventual runners-up of the competition.

Round Seven vs Bankstown at the Village Green

On a beautiful batting track at the VG, Bankstown won the toss and simply belted us to all parts of the ground, with their opener (149) in particular looking like a superstar at the age of 15.

At the end of the carnage, Bankstown smashed 9/344 off the 60 overs, with only Andrew Plummer (2/47 off 12) troubling the Dogs.

Another disastrous start (2 for none) really killed any chance of a chasing the mammoth total, but the lads dug in to make sure the game was a presented on a plate to Bankstown. Tim Hood (61), Anthony Brooks (46) and Luke Irwin (42) spent valuable batting time against their good attack to push UNSW to 7/185 off the 60 overs.

Whilst the season could have been more successful with some luck and experience, I feel the guys genuinely enjoyed the experience of Green Shield cricket and its small taste of future years in Grade cricket.

However, the season could not have been as enjoyable or successful without the efforts of some very important people.

On behalf of the UNSW Cricket Club, I wish to sincerely thank Howard Brady for all his countless hours acting as Manager, Organiser, some time Coach and a very helpful listener to me during the 2001/2002 Green Shield season. And to Barry Ross, a huge thanks from the Club for his willingness to assist by doing the scoring and also to help any other way. Thank you gentlemen.

Thanks also to Mrs Brooks, Mrs Plummer, Mr Irwin, Mr Somerville, Mr Purcell, Mr Dempsey and all the parents for their help throughout the season.

I eagerly look forward to seeing the development of the 2001/2002 players in future seasons - these guys can play cricket!

In the 13 games before Christmas we amassed just over 1300 runs hitting over 200 three times. We finished with 7 wins and 3 losses (one each to the other top 4 sides).

After Christmas was very different story we were unbeatable, we settled into a squad of 13, always putting 11 on the field. In the 6 games prior to the finals we plundered 1153, at an ave of 192 per game. Three times after Christmas we again hit 220 runs or better. Our best performance with the bat being 4 for 263 vs our arch enemy UTS-Balmain.

Our unspoken team tactics were to plunder each and every bowling attack we faced, to make opposition teams struggle for every run they made. 2001 UK TOUR REPORT

After a break of over ten years the Club resumed overseas touring with a trip to England and Ireland in July 2001. Twenty-five playing tourists from throughout the Club and various others (we even had a physio!) pulled on a bumblebee cap and jacket for a month and worked through an itinerary that included twenty games of cricket, two Ashes Tests and thirty consecutive nights on the piss. Each stage of the tour had its own flavour. In Leeds and Birmingham, after a punishing "budget" flight, our party was fresh but our cricket below our best while we acclimatised to the slow wickets and fast nightlife. This, combined with the local custom to ambush us with guest first class players saw us on the wrong end of a couple of early thrashings. The writing was on the wall when a Kiwi we had never heard of before, Lou Vincent, charged down the track to smoke Dan Christian's tour-opening delivery over cover for four. Our response of strengthening the slip cordon was well intentioned but spectacularly unsuccessful as he went on to score 62 out of the first 70. At these initial stages there was perhaps a danger of such rude awakenings becoming a bit of a pattern, but we responded in the way that any champion side would – by undertaking a moustache-growing competition.

It was true that before the tour started we would have said we would like to party hard but win everything, in particular the game against the "old enemy", the MCC, on the eve of the first Ashes Test. We didn't, but by the time we took our seats at Edgbaston we didn't give a bugger about any of that. Had we been able to put in an order for the day we probably would have asked for sunshine, Australia bowling out the Poms in a couple of sessions, and an hour or so of Slats going berserk at the end. We got all of this and some of our own notoriety thrown in, with our uniform, singing and obvious connection to Australia's opening bat making it hard for the TV cameras, or anyone else at the ground, to ignore us.

After Birmingham a more traditional sporting tour culture developed when we returned our thankfully undamaged hire cars to their owners and piled into minibuses to head for the south of England. By this time our cricket was slowly getting better and by the middle stages we were doing ourselves, and the letters we wrote to clubs when organising the itinerary, justice - albeit with an attack somewhat luxuriously endowed with spinners. Fortunately these improved performances coincided with some of our "blue ribbon" fixtures - Hambledon (Dave Carson's club and the "Cradle of Cricket"), Bickley (Morgs' and Tim Grosser's old club), Wimbledon (with Paul Urquhart and Jack Horley in opposition) and Clontarf (a '99 World Cup venue in Dublin where Clayton Jones and Springer once played).

There can be no doubt that unique circumstances (for example, having someone from our Club in the Test side) and great weather combined to give us the tour we had hoped for. Also contributing to its success was the makeup of our party, a diverse mix of characters who blended well and were an authentic representation of our Club back home. Whether it was Porno's mini-Barr Turn speeches, Jamo's self-portraits, Lamby's quest for the perfect hamburger, Robbo, Lachie and the Richos making a bumblebee fashion statement in the members at Lord's, Henry's daggy-celebrity cameos or our wholehearted "Stumps" efforts, we must have seemed a bit different to your average cricket club. Like we are.

The players were:

Tim Richardson: Deserved winner of both categories of the moustache-growing contest. Some quality innings but his bowling continues to disappoint. Forever into Club folklore with his "Tour de France" exploits (five sights in 24 hours by car from London).

Rohan Hamman: A fine all round tour which started at absolute full throttle and didn't ease off until he fell asleep head first into his seat on the flight home. Somehow averaged 70.00 with the bat. Another "Tour de France" member.

Alfie Langdon: A difficult ask to fit 15 hours sleep a day into touring life but somehow he managed it

Alex Lamb: Nothing printable.

Chris Jameson: You could synchronise watches using his 10.00 p.m. phone call home. Possible tour high point when he shouted "Howzat!" out of a car as it passed a game. Definite tour low point when he took two wickets bowling embarrassing shit against Arundel Cricket Club.

Greig Robinson: His early groin injury robbed us of a scarce commodity – line and length – but he was a general steadying influence nonetheless. Shaved his beard off for the first time since 1976 for the moustache-growing contest.

Peter Richardson: Injury limited his on field appearances but had absolutely no effect on his prodigious nightlife. Carried off the Chairman of Selectors job with the least controversy in the history of the position at the Club.

Warren Saunders: The consummate tourist, somehow managing to lead from the front on and off the field for the full four weeks. "Tour de France" participant and probably had some serious explaining to do when his credit card statements arrived back home. Taxi drivers throughout England breathed a huge sigh of relief when he boarded the plane for Sydney.

Jim Plunkett-Cole: Was the first tourist to chat someone up when he faked not knowing how his small screen worked immediately after take-off from Sydney. Produced a quality bullshitting effort when talking our entire party into a nightclub in Brighton. Sold his wicket far more dearly than his soul.

Ben Nott: Started the tour pissing in his sleep and finished it keeping in it, being the only specialist gloveman on the trip. Despite his taxing schedule, remained immaculately turned out throughout, with the possible exception of the time he shared a load of washing with Lachlan Taylor.

Dan Christian: A tour of two halves. Looked like he might break all sorts of Club records early on, threatening not just to burn both ends of the candle, but explode them. However, the news in Birmingham of his selection in the Australian Under 19 side saw him start living a little more for tomorrow.

Henry: Proud wearer of our jacket at all manner of Ashes occasions throughout England and managed one game for us between Guardian articles, skippering against the MCC. Still scratching his head about the LBW umpire P. Richardson failed to give him that day and produced some vintage stuff when loudly encouraging Dan Christian to bowl at the opposition front footers' heads.

Mike Gregg: Underrated by every batsman he bowled against, often to their peril. Won huge respect by attending high-level business meetings sporting a very ordinary looking part-cultivated moustache.

Kieran Cleary: Team physio, reluctant player and dedicated confidant of every woman in England going through a relationship crisis.

Ruche Wickremasena: A punishing and enormously expensive personal itinerary, which occasionally coincided with the rest of the party's activities. Does anyone know if he got back?

Tim Buckett: Fortunately TB, one the few people in the Club ever to demonstrate the financial acumen and responsibility to go with their qualifications, was looking after the money. As a result we didn't run out. Bravely brought his wife on tour.

Mullen: A lovely tour, only spoilt by his pathetic turn and chase efforts in the field when his knees were buggered.

Lachlan Taylor: Nearly committed suicide when the greentops he anticipated failed to materialise. Highlights were his near hat-trick at Haywards Heath and his bat throw at Halverstown (Ireland). Could've paid more attention to the washing instructions on his tour gear.

David Carson: Somehow kept up with the party while juggling professional cricket commitments and driving around in one of the dodgiest looking cars in the UK. Showed a dishonest streak when he allowed the party to think he was forgoing a trip to France to make up the numbers and bowl medium pace against Bickley Park 2nds, when in fact he had left his passport in Southampton.

Peter Carson: The lack of reward for performing the noble art of legspin on slow wickets set in the middle of postage-stamp grounds drove him to excessive drinking (and a quick trip to Paris). Still the funniest "Stumps" player in the history of the world.

Mick Mag: It is a tragedy that Porno will be most remembered for spilling beer on Ian Healy at Edgbaston, when his efforts in coming up with a Barr-Turn style speech after every game were far more noteworthy. Appeared to need a stint at a health farm, or at least rehydration, by the end of the England leg.

Mick Elliott: Sometimes found runs hard to come by, but had no such difficulty picking up pints. Coined the phrases "Crumpet!" and "Scrumpy!" Just like at home, he was underbowled.

Keith Taylor: A marvellous tour, highlighted by his drinking Warren Saunders under the table in a Brighton nightclub, not long before strutting his stuff with some professional podium dancers. Had a big Irish leg, outscoring his brother with the bat on the first day, losing his passport on the second and missing his flight back to London on the fourth.

Damon Dermody: Sadly work commitments limited his on field appearances but he could always be counted on for some vocal support or, more often, derision from the sidelines. His unfortunate run out after provocatively taking on the field at his old club in Birmingham was "Tour Gold".

Clayton Jones: Brought some much-needed civilisation to the party.

David Quinlin: Ticked off a few long held dreams in a brief stay but sadly besmirched his hard-school reputation by being the first player to be officially disciplined for turning up late to a game.

To close I would like to sincerely thank the guys, and particularly the younger members, in the tour party. Before we left I had visions of all sorts of difficult scenarios occurring (delicate negotiations with airlines, hotel owners and police, breaking up fights, repairing cars, going to hospitals etc.) but there was none of that. As a group I believe we got the balance of fun and responsibility exactly right and represented the Club in a way that we and the Club could be proud of.
